To aid the Seventh War Loan Drive, Wilson & Company's famous six-horse hitch of Clydesdale geldings, drawing the War Bond Wagon, will appear in O'Neill, Nebr., May 15, 1945, according to Tom A. Leadley, Chairman of the Agriculture Division, War Finance Committee of Nebraska.

Because the team has long been a favorite with farm and city folk alike, at fairs and livestock shows in this country and abroad for the past 25 years, the appearance of these great bay and white Clydes-

dales, galloping together as one in such maneuvers as high speed turns, circles and "figure eights" promises to be an unforgettable spectacle.

"The hitch's appearance in O'Neill," Mr. Leadley said, "is expected to stimulate the sale of War Bonds to help Uncle Sam buy the guns, planes, tanks and ships needed in this mechanized war." He said that it should also help Nebraska reach its 92 million dollar Seventh War Loan goal, 55 million dollars of which must come from sales to individuals.

Recent addition of two new purebred Clydesdales is said to place the six-hitch at its peak. The two new horses were brought to this country from Scotland at a time when submarines infested the North Atlantic. The freighter on which they were being brought from Scotland was torpedoed about 1500 miles out of Glasgow and had to limp back to its starting point. Boiler trouble forced their second ship back to port. On the third attempt, a submarine that was sighted was

driven off by depth charges. It took seven weeks before the geldings were finally delivered to a Wilson & Company representative at St. Johns, New Brunswick.

Because of their size, the horses travel in special equipment where they are constantly attended by experienced grooms. Although they receive the exceptional care due to prize animals, all of them, except for the limited period of their War Bond tour, perform routine work daily in and about the Wilson & Company plant in Chicago.
