EDITORIAL CORRESPONDENCE.

LINCOLN, Jan. 9th 1875. The Legislature convened on Thursday at 2 o'clock and each house immediately proceeded to organization, which was speedily effected.

The Senate was called to order by Mr. Chapman of Cass Co., and D. H. Wheeler was nominated and elected as temporary Secretary.

The House of Representatives elected A. G. Hastings of Lancaster Co., temporary Speaker.

After the preliminaries, Edwin S. Towle, of Richardson county was elected Speaker by unanimous vote of the House.

The officers of the House, are: Chief Clerk, Geo. L. Brown, of Butler Co.

Assistant Clerk, J. F. Zediker, of Franklin county. Sergeant-at-Arms, John W. Manning, of Pawnee county.

Enrolling Clerk, Miss Sarah Funke, of Lancaster county. Engrossing Clerk, S. P. Jones, of Lincoln county.

Chaplain, Rev. Geo. Alexander, of Lancaster county. Friday afternoon, a joint convention was held, to receive the Governor's Message, which is the longest document we ever saw, so far as we can remember, emanating upon which we will make in another place.

The Governor read his Message in clear, distinct tone, which was listened to, with close attention, but few signs of weariness being perceptible. The day was fearfully cold, for which reason but few persons appeared in the galleries. To-day both houses adjourned, the Senate until Monday afternoon, and the House, until Tuesday morning.

Board then adjourned sine die FRANK MATTESON, Chairman. J. A. TULLEYS, Clerk. Jan. 5th 1875. A regular session of the Board of County Commissioners convened Jan. 5th 1875 at 10 o'clock a. m. Full Board present. Minutes of last meeting read and approved.

Clark instructed to procure a book for Treasurer to keep account with Road Districts. Curtis Beal appointed Road Supervisor for Road Dist. No. 7. L. N. Edson having failed to qualify. Official Bond of Curtis Beal approved and he was duly qualified.

The following accounts audited and allowed: A M Hardy, Comr's fees, \$17.00 Frank Matteson, " " \$21.60 Geo W Ball, " " \$14.00 E H Jones per cent on collections \$292.94.

The property of Uriah Beal, consisting of wagon, mule team and harness was ordered placed on the Tax List for 1874, at a valuation of \$175.00. The order of December 8th 1874, calling an election to vote bonds to purchase seed was rescinded by a unanimous vote.

F Houchin Road Supervisor R. D. No. 9, authorized to get enough old bridge lumber to build bridge across a ravine in said Dist. J L Miller, employed to put shutters to windows of Court House, and fix the door securely for the sum of \$20.00 in county warrants.

Treasurer authorized to pay redemption and interest to date on tax certificates on W. J. Sec. 1. all of Sec's 2, 3 & 4 & E J Sec. 5 T. 1. Range 12. Board then adjourned until Monday January 18th 1875, at 10 o'clock a. m. A. M. HARDY, Chairman. J. A. TULLEYS, Clerk.

Thermometer 6 degrees below zero Jan. 4th at Grand Island. "Siab" Blodgett was recently killed on the B & M Road, being a brakeman on said road. Only 47 marriage licenses were issued in Grand Island the past year against 148 in 1873, but the Times thinks there will be at least 200 in 1875.

The Cedar County Advocate has changed hands. In the Omaha Republican of Jan. 6. Mrs. Mobley of the Grand Island Independent vindicates herself, and says the next "tool" will "meet the same if not a worse fate" than Wiley. The Omaha Rep., favors the reunion of Douglas and Sarpy counties.

Quite a shooting affair took place in Grand Island on Monday Jan 4th. Several shots were fired said to be aimed at Jno. Kraft by B. L. Easley, late editor of "Orchard and Vineyard." Easley was bound over in the sum of \$1000. It is reported that the Lowell Register is to be resumed by F. M. Comstock and that he is to receive a bonus of \$1,000. The last is rather doubtful. -Red Cloud Chief.
