DE WILCOX.

—Last week, just as we were going to press, we announced the death of Dr. THOMAS B. WILLIAMS who died about 3 o'clock last Thursday morning.

—He was a native of Wales, and about forty years of age,—we are unable to give his exact age—and came to America previous to the breaking out of the war. He served during the war, in the Mississippi and Gulf squadrons, and was discharged because he came to Nebraska, from whence he came to Nebraska. The doctor was one of the first settlers of Webster County, coming here in the summer or fall of 1870, and wintering in the old stockade. He assisted materially in the organization of the county, and was elected County Clerk, a position he held two years. Since that time until his death he was engaged in the practice of medicine. Warm-hearted and full of generous impulses he made many friends who will miss him.

The funeral services took place on Friday, and were conducted by Rev. Chas. Reilly, of Juniata. A large number of the friends and acquaintances of the deceased attended the funeral services, and followed his remains to their final resting place.

Proceedings of the Teachers Institute.

Red Cloud, April 22, 1875.

The Teachers Institute of Webster County met at the school house on Thursday morning.

Called to order at 11 o'clock by Co. Supt., H. S. Kaley.

Opened by singing 'Welcome Sweet Sunshine'—Singing conducted by Mrs. Abby Maxwell and Mrs. Alma Springer. Prayer following by Rev. A. Maxwell; after which Co. Supt., made a few practical remarks in regard to the object of the Institute; and announced the programme for the afternoon session—completing the organization by electing a Secretary.

—Adjourned until half past one o'clock.

—Afternoon session, opened by singing 'Come to the Savior. Exercises in Geography, conducted by C. W. Springer.

—Singing in Mathematics, clearly presented by Rev. A. Maxwell.

—Singing Primary class in reading led by Miss Noble. C. W. Kaley then illustrated his views of teaching Grammar; followed by A. L. Burton's exercise in Orthography.

—Miss Noble was chosen critic. Closed by singing 'Shall We Gather at the River. Adjourned until evening session to commence at 7 o'clock.

—Evening session opened at 7 o'clock by singing. Following this an address by C. W. Springer, entitled, 'Teaching a Profession.'—Singing.

—C. W. Kaley delivered a declamation entitled 'Common Schools.'—Singing.

—Mrs. C. H. Smith read an original essay entitled 'The Teacher's Life.'—Singing.

—A. L. Burton favored us with select reading 'City and Country.'—Singing.

—Miss Wells then read a spicy original essay, Miss Noble read a select piece entitled 'Over the River.'—Singing.

—Then an address by Rev. A. Maxwell—Subject, 'The Relation of the Teacher to the Recreation of his Scholars.' Followed by the opening of the query box.

—Singing.

—Adjourned until 9 o'clock in the morning.

—Morning session opened by singing and prayer by C. W. Springer. Roll was called; Secretary's report read and approved; then followed the reading of the Critic's report. Rev. A. Maxwell then resumed his exercise in Mathematics.—C. W. Springer, Geography. A reading exercise conducted by Mrs. C. H. Smith. After which Sept. Kaley made appropriate remarks upon the necessity of teaching the children elocution.

—Singing and SHOUT RESUME.

—C. W. Kaley continued his exercise in Grammar, and A. L. Burton, his Orthography.

—Singing.

—Adjourned until evening.

—The exercises were interrupted on Thursday afternoon by the death of Dr. Williams, but resumed again in the evening.

—Opened by singing 'Remember Me,' and the evening concluded.

most consisted of select reading, original essays and singing.

The first piece was 'Barbara Freethie,' select reading by A. L. Burton. Then followed original essay 'Flora,' by Miss Alma Springer; Select reading by Mrs. C. H. Smith, 'No Seat in Heaven'; Essay, 'Our Leaders,' by Miss F. C. Grubb; Reading: 'The Stars,' by Miss Mary C. Deal; 'King Broke and the Spider,' by Miss Edith Talley; 'The Passion,' by C. W. Springer. The whole was interspersed with singing. This closed the exercises of the Institute, which were harmonious and pleasant.

The following resolutions introduced by A. L. Burton were adopted.

Resolved, that the teachers of Webster county, Neb., having assembled themselves together in an Institute for mutual improvement, in this our chosen profession; and, whereas, having spent very profitable hours together, and having been hospitably entertained by the citizens of Red Cloud. Therefore,

Resolved, that we the teachers of this Institute, will in the future show our appreciation of the teaching of our County Superintendent, and others, by practicing in our schools the best suggestions here given, and endeavor to be more energetic, earnest and faithful in our profession.

Resolved, that we extend our thanks to the citizens of Red Cloud for the hospitable manner in which we have been entertained; also to the school board for kindly granting us the use of their building.

Resolved, that our Secretary furnish the Nebraska Teacher and the RED CLOUD CHIEF for publication a copy of the proceedings of the Institute for Singing 'Catch the Sunshine,' after which the Institute adjourned.
