The Interior of the Ocean.

The popular ideas with regard to the sinking of bodies in the sea have usually been quite unscientific. Some have theorized to the effect that, in the case of ships which founder at sea, they sink to a certain depth and then float about until broken to pieces, or thrown upon some bank beneath the sea-indeed, a book was some time ago published, sus taining this ides. Others, again, argue that the buoyant force of the water at great depths is enormous, and due to the whole pressure of the water above, and that all bodies which are lighter than water at the surface, will, if sunk to the bottom and detached from the sinker, shoot upward with a great velocity, or, in other words, that the density of the water increases directly with the depth.

Now, it is proved by the most reliable investigations, that, though the pressure increases with the depth-even to the amount of fifteen pounds upon every square inch for every thirty-four feet in depth-the density is not thereby in ereased sensibly, owing to the mcomslowly improving, but may die suddenly presability of the water; so that, in reality, neither the buoyant force, nor the resistance to the motion of any body, is sensbly augmented from the surface to

At the depth of three thousand fathoms for instance, the pressure upon a square inch is nearly eight thousand pounds; but the column of eight thousand teet of water is only shortened about sixty feet. The density is thus but slightly increased; but the effect of such enormous pressure etc., is to condense them into a smaller bulk, by which they may be rendered heavier than water, and will sink of their own weight. On the 19th of May, the trial of the question of the insanity of Mrs. Lincoln, widow of Abraham Lincoln, came up in the County Court of Cook County, Illinois. The proceedings were based on a petition filed by Robert Lincoln. setting forth that his mother, Mary Lincoln, has property not exceeding \$75,incapable of managing her estate, and resident of that State of indulging in praying for the insuance of an order for a warrant and venire to test the question of her sanity. The petition was accompanied by a certificate of the family physician, to the effect that he had examined Mrs. Lincoln and was of the opinion that she is insane and a fit sub-

ject for the hospital treatment. Beveral witnesses testified to eccentricities in the conduct of Mrs. Lincoln, which com-Lincoln, and which have become marked as time progressed. John C. Breckinridge, born near Lexington, Ky., Jan. 21, 1831, was educated On the breaking out of the Mexican war, in 1867, he volunteered for military service, and was chosen major in a regiment of Kentucky volunteers. On his return he was elected to the Kentucky house of representatives. In 1851 he was elected to congress, and re-elected in 1858. At the election of 1856 Mr Breckinridge was chosen vice president with Mr. Buchanan president, and presided in the senate with dignity and ability for the next four years. In 1860 he was one of the candidates of the democratic party for the presidency, but was defeated. At the commencement of the civil war he was a United States senator from Kentucky, but openly avowed his sympathy with the confederates, and soon after joined them, and was expelled from the United States senate in Decem ber, 1861. The following summer h was appointed a major general in the confederate army, and took part in several battles, but did not distinguish himself as a military commander. He was secretary of war in Jefferson Davis'cabinet from Pebruary, 1865, to the close of the war. In June of that year he co caped from the country to Cube, and thence to England. He remained abroad till 1869, when he returned, and avowed his determination to take no part in litics henceforth, a resolution which he has strictly observed, devoting his attention entirely to his professi
