REGULATIONS.

The Fair Grounds will be open for the reception of all articles and stock on the first day of the fair, at 8 o'clock A. M.

ENTRIES.

may be made at any convenient time at the Secretary's office, at Red Cloud previous to the opening of the Fair, and after that time at his office on the fair grounds.

1. All exhibitors must purchase membership tickets before making entries, a firm being regarded as one person, but only one member of the firm will be admitted to the grounds on the ticket that allows the firm to compete.

2. Articles that are the products of the soil must be entered in the name of the producer, and animals must be entered by and in the name of the owner of the same, and articles that are the result of mechanical or artistic skill may be entered in the name of the artist or contriver by their agent.

3. On the entry of each article or animal a card will be furnished to the exhibitor designating the number of the article, the sex and color, and the name of the exhibitor, which card must be attached to and remain on the article or animal during the fair. And no article or animal will be assigned a place on the ground until the entry has been made as above stated, and must remain on exhibition during the fair.

4. No entry can be made after 5 o'clock of the Fair, except in case of unavoidable detention.

5. A single animal may be exhibited singly, as one of a herd or pair, and in sweepstakes, but shall not be otherwise entered in more than one class or lot.

6. Entries of Thorough-bred must be statements and copies of such pedigrees as are required by the awarding committee, and must be delivered by the Secretary to the awarding committee before awards are made.

7. Exhibitors are expected at all times to give their necessary attention to whatever they may have on exhibition, and at the close of the Fair, to take entire charge of the same. Diligence will be used by the officers of the society to prevent injuries, but in no case will the society be responsible for any damages or loss that may occur.

8. Persons desiring space for the exhibition of articles not entered for competition can have it allotted by applying to the secretary, giving name of article and owner and space required.

9. All articles not enumerated in the premium list, will be entered in their appropriate class, and if found worthy will be awarded a diploma or premium.

INVITED GUESTS.

10. The officers of the Agricultural and Mechanical Societies, and members of the Press are respectfully invited to attend the Fair without further notice.

AWARDING COMMITTEES.

12. Awarding Committees will be selected from various sections of this and adjoining counties, and no fixed of their appointment on or before the first day of the Fair, at which time they will be furnished with premium list by the secretary.

Members of the awarding committees will report to the superintendent of classes at 10 o'clock A. M. of the day that is fixed in the programme for awarding premiums on the class in which they are elected to judge.

No article or animal that may be deemed unworthy shall be entitled to a premium, but in all cases where there is no competition a second premium shall be awarded to articles worthy of a premium.

Awarding committees will report to the secretary as soon as practicable after viewing the articles on exhibition. Red ribbon shall designate 1st, and blue ribbon 2d premiums.
