—We received a present of a very nice broom from the Forbes brothers, living at the half way house between this place and Hastings, and as a consequence have our other nice and clean brooms. The Forbes boys make the best brooms we have seen in this county.

—The weather after our little storm Monday has cleared off, and at least the snow has disappeared to a great extent.

—The next farmers' Institute will be held on the 21st and 22nd of May.
