CALL FOR A REPUBLICAN STATE CONVENTION.

TO NOMINATE CANDIDATES FOR STATE OFFICES.

The Republican electors of the State of Nebraska are hereby called to send delegates from the several counties to meet in State Convention at Lincoln on Tuesday, the 26th day of September, 1876, for the purpose of placing in nomination candidates for the following named offices, viz:

Three presidential electors and three electors, one Member of Congress, one Member of Congress Contingent, Governor, Secretary of State, Auditor, Treasurer.

Superintendent of Public Instruction, Attorney General, and State Auditor.

Each elector shall be entitled to represent his county in the business as may be transacted before the convention.

The State Committee of the Convention is as follows:

W. A. Holmes, for Governor; W. H. Holmes, for Secretary of State; G. W. Ball, for Auditor; J. H. Hobart, for Treasurer.

Delegates to the State Convention will be elected by the following meetings:

Lincoln, Aug. 20th; Omaha, Aug. 21st; Fremont, Aug. 22d; Hastings, Aug. 23d; Grand Island, Aug. 24th; Kearney, Aug. 25th; Laramie, Aug. 26th; Cheyenne, Aug. 27th; Scottsbluff, Aug. 28th; and the State Convention will be held at Lincoln, on the 26th day of September, 1876.

MINUTES OF THE COUNTY REPUBLICAN CONVENTION, HELD AT RED CLOUD SEPTEMBER 24 1876.

The Republican electors of Webster County assembled as per call by chairman Co. Central Committee at 2 o'clock P. M., Sept. 24 1876. A. M. Hardy was chosen temporary chairman and R. B. Fulton, Sec.

The following gentlemen were appointed com. on credentials, W. D. McKinney, L. B. Thorne, Chas Buschow, G. P. Cather, J. H. Hobart, A. T. Ayers, Abe Garber, L. H. Hummel, Oscar Arnold, and Peter McNitt.

The Com. after due deliberation made the report which was adopted.

On motion the temporary officers were made the officers of the permanent organization.

On motion the chairman of each delegation was authorized to cast the absences.

Convention then took an informal ballot for representative, with the following result: J. E. Smith, 34; L. B. Thorne, 4; R. B. Fulton, 1.

On motion of Mr. Thorne J. E. Smith was declared the unanimous choice of the convention.

Convention then proceeded to ballot for county commissioner for the second district. Geo. Ball receiving 27 votes, N. Haney 5, John McCallum, 3, F. M. Snow 3. Geo. Ball, after a good humored speech from Mr. Snow, was unanimously declared the nominee.

For the third District, W. J. Vance was nominated, having received 30 votes on the informal ballot. Thus, Kennedy receiving 4, and G. W. Knight 1.

A. Garder, J. R. Wilcox, H. G. Bill and Ed. Kellogg, were elected delegates to the Senatorial Convention.

I. H. Hummel, Aherl Beal and L. B. Thorne were chosen delegates to the judicial convention. L. B. Thorne declined to act as delegate.

On motion the chairman of the delegation was authorized to cast the vote of the absent members.

M. H. Warner, W. N. Richardson and G. W. Knight were elected delegates to the state convention.

The following gentlemen were appointed a county central committee.

On motion, M. H. Warner was elected chairman of the committee.

The State Journal of last wednesday published a report of the compilation of the preliminary prepared by one of the printers. From thenceforth the treatment of the prisoners seems to be growing in accord with the spirit of the age. There is a school and library of 150 volumes for the improvement and elevation of the character of the inmates, and we doubt not that the effect of these measures will be beneficial to the state.

Democracy in accepting a nomination is an unusual fact. One democrat has been found who does not want office. The New York State Convention wants to nominate Seymour for Governor but Seymour telegraphed to his friends that his health was too poor and requested them to prevent his name from being used. The convention, however, determined to force the nomination upon him, and he was nominated by acclamation. Possibly Seymour was afraid of Morgan. It would have been an interesting strife. Two governors should make things lively.

The Democracy acts as if it were leading the victory. Thus far there have been no great speeches, no mass meetings, nothing of any kind. The leaders are maintaining a profound quiet, apparently in the hope that the full republican vote may not be polled and that the people, if no fight is made, may lose interest in the campaign. A fear of rousing opponents is the only reasonable motive for the attitude of the democrats.

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For the third District, W. J. Vance was nominated, having received 30 votes than any in the union, and her wealth is less. Kearney for instance with a publication of 1500 had, two daily papers. We don't believe there is a town of that size east of the Mississippi whose wants are so well satisfied.

The initial steps for the construction of the Omaha and Republican Valley Railroad were taken at Wahoo, Nebraska on the 29th of August. A large number of the prominent business men of Omaha were present. Moses Stocking was chairman of the meeting. Mr. S. H. Clark, resident director and general superintendent of the U. P. road and bridge and the commissioners of the White County letter proposing the railroad will vote \$14,000.

It is proposed that the railroad will build the line from Wahoo to the 1st fork of the Niobrara and offer 10% interest. It is the hands of the stockholders to decide and ask and Peter McCallum, A. Garder, J. R. Wilcox, H. G. Bill and Ed. Kellogg, were elected delegates to the Senatorial Convention.
