Railroad Meeting!

Proceedings of the Railroad meeting held at Red Cloud, March 31, '77.

Meeting called to order, Mr. Yeiser in the chair.

On motion M. L. Thomas was chosen Secretary.

The committee then made a statement of the proceedings of the meeting at Sutton which was the same in substance as the proceedings in another column, from the Sutton Times.

Mr. Yeiser then made some very sensible and timely remarks on railroad matters.

Joseph Garber made report of expenses of delegates while absent at Sutton.

On motion the report of the committee was accepted and committee discharged.

On motion a committee of five was elected to confer with the various railroad companies, in the interests of Webster county, and also to confer with the committees of the different counties on the proposed route from Wahoo to Red Cloud. The following Committee was chosen:

J. A. Tulley, Red Cloud; J. H. Hobart, Oak Creek; J. E. Smith, Guide Rock; R. B. Fulton, Walnut Creek; W. E. Thorne, Harmony.

The following resolution was offered by Mr. Garber and accepted:

Resolved, That this committee use all honorable means to secure the building of the Omaha and Republican Valley or some other railroad to strike the Republican valley not farther west than Red Cloud.

On motion a committee of five citizens of Red Cloud was appointed to look to the interests of Red Cloud, in railroad matters:

Rev. Maxwell, J. S. Gilham, H. S. Kaley, Com. M. L. Thomas, Peter Head

On motion, and by recommendation of Mr. Yeiser, a committee of two was appointed to confer with, and induce Russian immigration to Webster Co. Committee, Kaley Bros.

On motion, adjourned.
