One scene in his life brings out fully the man's character.

The first time I saw Jackson was at the celebration of the battle of New Orleans, at Nashville, Tennessee. He then impressed me, as I saw him on horseback, as one whom nature had stamped as a nobleman. He was a great man with a kind heart, the truest of friends, unswerving in duty. If he committed errors it was not from a disinclination to do what was right. The number of persons now living who were personally acquainted with Clay is growing less every year, and his fame now rests with the historian. From a perusal of his speeches, it may be difficult to understand the power which he wielded. Even we whos hearts were touched and played upon by his burning eloquence, can not de scribe his power to others. Clay never studied oratory; his eloquence was the blaze of an internal fire. Hence, his set speeches do not give a fair idea of his power. He needed the stimulant of a great occasion in order to rise to the full height of his power: The lecturer closed with an eloquent flight on the power of the orator. - From a Lecture by Secretary Thompson.


