Hastings polled 168 votes at the late municipal election. Beaver City voted 211 miles for school purposes the coming year. Sidney contains a population of 1,000, according to the census, census.

The commissioners of Adams county have placed the liquor license at \$400.

Mrs. Elizabeth Cady Stanton will make a lecture tour through Nebraska this spring.

The director of Fairmont school district, Fairmont county, receives a salary of \$200 per annum.

The Presbyterian Presbytery of the South Platte met at Nebraska City on Tuesday of last week.

A large party of immigrants, after looking all over Kansas location, settled last week in vicinity of Lyons, Bart county, this State.

It is expected that the Nebraska City distillery will be started up this spring by parties from Peoria, Ill. It will consume 1,000 bushels of corn per day.

Two thousand eight hundred and forty-three acres of Otos reservation lands were entered at the Interior land office in March. It was principally bought on two years time payments third cash.

Brownville shipped 28 car-loads of cattle and hogs the past week, besides a great deal of wheat and corn. Two new warehouses will be built in the city this spring.

A free dinner was served in each ward to the voters of Falls City on election day. One hundred and six died in the first ward and two hundred and ten in the second.

A monstrous cat-fish, weighing 88 pounds, was caught in the Missouri river near Puma one day last week.

At the recent municipal election, Falls City elected the entire temperance ticket with the exception of mayor.

During the month of March there were sold through the office at Hastings, 2,500 copies of the St. Joe & D. C. railroad lands, representing some thing like \$25,000 cash.

The next annual meeting of the Nebraska state sportsmen's association will be held at Fremont the 21st of May. Extensive arrangements are being made. Among other things there will be a dog show.

The state board of assessment have fixed the valuation per mile of railroads in this state as follows: Union Pacific, \$10,658; Burlington and Missouri River, \$6,464; Nebraska Railway, \$6,800; Atchison and Nebraska, \$4,748; St. Joe and D. C., \$4,842; Sioux City and Pacific, \$4,378; Omaha and Southern Valley, \$2,612.

Beaver Daily Times. Articles of incorporation of "The Boulder, Platte and Republican Valley Railway Company" were to day filed in the office of secretary of State. The object is to construct and operate a railroad from Boulder, Boulder county, to Greeley, Weld county, and from Greeley down the Platte valley, and on the west direct and practicable route to the valley of the Republican River, at or near where it crosses the east line of the State into Nebraska; and thence down the valley of the Republican to a connection with the various roads approaching Colorado from the east. The capital stock is fixed at \$300,000, to be divided into shares of 100 each. The principal office of the company will be kept at Boulder, and the principal business carried on in Boulder and Weld counties. The incorporators are James North, T. W. Moffat, E. G. Lyons, John J. Bush and Lemuel McIntosh, who also form the board of directors for the first year. This road is designed to be a connection between the Boulder Central & Utah (being under the same management) and the first line that comes up the Republican.
