NOT SO BAD AN EXPERIENCE AS IT SEEMED.

Your communication of the 18th., concerning railroad matters in which you stated that parties in your county are using as an argument against voting bonds for railroads that you will not be able to get satisfactory rates of freight on grain and stock, and citing Gage county as an instance of opposition, is at hand.

In reply I will say, as to Gage county railroad matters, I think everything is satisfactory to the people of our county. I have been a constant shipper of live stock from this place ever since the road was built and have always been able to get a very satisfactory rate.

When I was at Red Cloud a year ago I fully realized the disadvantages that you were laboring under by not having a railroad, and the people of Webster county and especially Red Cloud should not miss this their golden opportunity to secure this road.

With it they can compete successfully with Hastings and other markets along the main line, getting as much for grain, hogs and cattle at home as they would after hauling and driving them forty or fifty miles.

I well remember when I was obliged to freight my produce to Nebraska City and Brownsville, a distance of fifty five miles, to market; and now with our railroad we are able to get as much for grain and stock as they can pay at those points.

I know that this matter of railroad bonds looks easy to a good many, but when you take into consideration the fact that the road is going to increase your property and population, and bring money and trade into your county, I cannot see how you can do otherwise than do all in your power to secure this road. With it, together with your natural advantages, I predict for Webster county a glorious future.

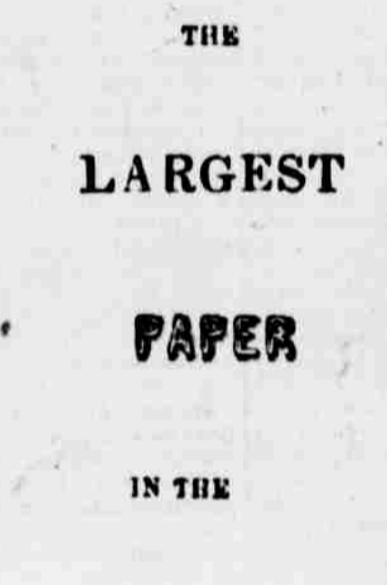
