KALEY BIRD.
"Thou laugh at who laughs?" is an old adage, and we think that this time, the laugh over Kaley's end of the patch, will come to naught if we are to judge from the talk of "corner lots," "side walks," &c. which one can hear about there just now.

We took a ride down to that field the other evening and among other things we noted the following:
The depot of the new railroad is located in the midst of that patch of corn.

Mr. Kaley is building a livery and feed stable—42x44, capable of holding 17 teams of horses. It is being built by Mr. J. K. Aultz who expects to carry on the business when the building is finished.

South of the track we found Mr. S. J. Dyer, from Jewell, Centre Kansas, who is building a boarding house 42x24, and will put up a stable for the accommodation of travelers.

Proceeding east a few rods we noticed a road graded, which leads directly into J. Wiggon and Son's large elevator. This consists of three buildings, one principally for an office and weighers room, with room overhead for grain, another the elevator properly feet in height, and another for the horse power, also a storage room for 5000 bushels. When finished this establishment will contain all the most modern improvements necessary in a first class grain ware house. The facilities for weighing, unloading and weighing light, without moving the team will be excellent. Another set of scales on the outside to be used for weighing corn &c. The ten trucked cars are each capable of holding 1200 bushels of wheat. His arrangements for shipping are conducive to rapidly handling the grain. He has storage capacity for about 15000 bushels, and he will be ready for an active business by the last of next week.

He has now on hand several thousand bushels stored in his cars, awaiting the cars. Mr. Wiggon is a man who thoroughly understands his business, is a very pleasant gentleman to meet, and his manner of conducting his accounts at the office, with the bank, and the home firm at Chicago, shows him to be a careful financial business man.

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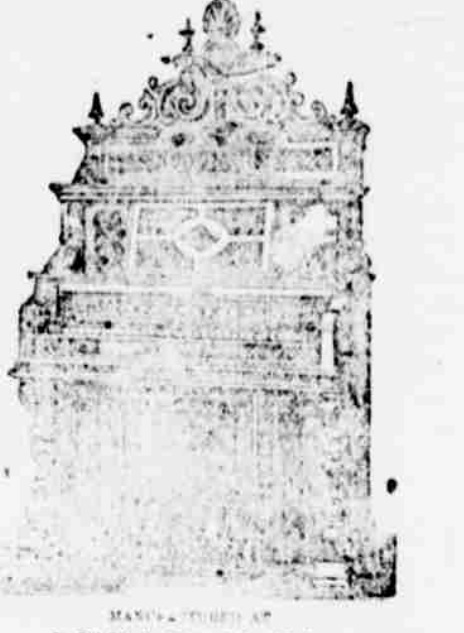
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
