

Through the kindness of Deputy State Treasurer, O. M. Barrett, we are enabled to furnish the readers of *The Journal* the exact figures, total collections, disbursements, and balances of the Treasury Department for the fiscal year ending November 30, 1878. There are some transfers from one fund to another, which show a larger collection and disbursement than the actual amounts, but the balances on hand are just as they stood at the close of business last Saturday night:

As will be seen by the above report there is now on hand the largest amount ever before accumulated in the State Treasury, \$460,181.99. Of this amount \$103,145.05 will be apportioned by the State Superintendent of Public Instruction and will be returned to the several counties to be used in supporting the public schools of our State. Of the \$11,874.00 in the permanent school fund \$30,000 of that has been invested in bonds and will be paid out some time this week. The amount in the State General Fund, \$162,577.95, will be reduced by the payment of the last quarterly salaries of the present State officers and the running expenses of the State institutions, and will leave a balance to carry the Legislature through their session and pay the warrants as fast as drawn. The County Treasurers have just paid in, during the last sixty days, their collections for the past six months, and no more remittances can be expected from them for some time to come.
