—Wm. Sawyer lives down on the bottom south of the village, and has one of the richest farms in the county. He is one of the few—the very few—who have paid in advance for their paper. Also send a copy to his father in Iowa.

—J. B. Watts makes his home and trading place south of the river. Has a good farm but has been unable until the last year to cultivate it very extensively. He raised some good potatoes, to which we can testify, as they fit our taste most admirably.

—John Shelton, one of the first settlers in the country, and one who raised the first wheat grown here, has made a comfortable home about two miles north of town. His house, a species of *abode*—made of setting stones in a grotto a short distance apart, bracing willow bushes around them and plastering both inside and out with clay, previously mixed to a stiff mortar with hay, cut to the length of two inches, and water—a very comfortable, neat, clean, cheap and durable.

—He has 200 rods of Osage hedge which we examined and found better than any of the age we have seen and the best cultivated fogs and largest, choicest selection of small fruits in the county.

He has two great grape vines that are ready to bear their bounties of the most delicious Concordes imaginable.

—Mr. Hollings has a good claim but was away from home when we called. Every thing around indicated a spirit of thrift however.

—H. Connelly is working on his farm and digging the ditches from the damp, dark mud as rapidly as possible.
