CURE FARM & FRIENDS
As Seen by the CHIEF in its Tourna-
lism through the County.
GUIDE BOOK

—Was Sawyer lives down on the
bottom south of the village and has
one of the richest farms in the county.
He is one of the few—the very few—
who have paid in advance for their
paper. Also send a copy to his fa-
ther in Iowa.
—J. B. Watta makes his home and
sheds place south of the river.
Has a good farm but has been unable
until the last year to cultivate it very
extensively. He raised some good po-
tatoes, to which we can testify, as they
fit our taste most admirably.
—John Shelton, one of the first
settlers in the county, and one who
raised the first wheat grown here,
has made a comfortable home place
two miles north of town. His house,
a species of a *chateau*—made by setting
posts in the ground a short distance
apart, brading willow withes around
them and plastering both inside and
out with clay, previously mixed to a
stiff mortar with hay, cut to the length
of two inches, and water—is very
comfortable, neat, clean, cheap and
durable.
He has over 200 rods of Orange hedges
which we examined and found better
than any of the age we have seen and
the best cultivated form and largest,
glorious selection of small fruits in
the county.
He has two great grape vines that
are ready to "bear their burden" of
the most delicious Concord's imagin-
able.
Mrs S. baked the first dinner for
heretofore hands and throats in the
county.
—Mr. Halberly has a good claim
but was away from home when we
called. Every thing around indicated
a spirit of thrift however.
—H. Connelly is working on his
farm and digging the dollars from the
damp, dark mold as rapidly as possi-
ble.

**Our excellent part of our earth's
