SENATE.

WASHINGTON, Tuesday, Jan. 28.—Edmunds, by request, introduced a bill authorizing the President to provide military police regulations for the government of the various forts, arsenals, and other places committed thereunder.

HOUSE.

The legislative appropriation bill was reported and referred to the committee of the whole. The bill to restrict immigration of Chinese was taken up and passed by a vote of 193 yeas.

SENATE.

WASHINGTON, Wednesday, Jan. 29.—The Senate bill promoting the efficiency of the chaplains of the United States was passed. It provides for the appointment of 25 chaplains.

HOUSE.

The House went into committee of the whole on the postoffice appropriation bill. Foster submitted an amendment regarding postal transportation by railroad for the fiscal year ending June, 1910.

SENATE.

WASHINGTON, Thursday, January 30.—The resolution of Edmunds declaring the validity of the 13th, 14th and 15th amendments to the Constitution was taken up, and Morgan advocated his substitute of January 30th.

HOUSE.

The postoffice appropriation bill was passed. Many of the amounts were increased. A motion to go into committee of the whole on the army appropriation bill was defeated.

SENATE.

WASHINGTON, Friday, Jan. 31.—Voorhees, by request, reported a resolution instructing the Secretary of the Interior to report the additional clerical force necessary in the pension office.

HOUSE.

From the committee on judiciary, a report was made on the bill to amend the act of 1872 relating to the practice of law in the District of Columbia.

SENATE.

WASHINGTON, Saturday, Feb. 1.—McCreary, from the joint committee to inquire into the expediency of transferring the Indian Bureau from the Interior to the War Department, submitted a report.

HOUSE.

After the morning hour the House resumed the regular order of business, the reading of the report of the committee on the bill to amend the act of 1872 relating to the practice of law in the District of Columbia.

SENATE.

WASHINGTON, Monday, Feb. 2.—McCreary introduced a bill to transfer the office of Indian Affairs from the Interior to the War Department.

HOUSE.
