In 1861, at the commencement of the war, I served my country as a juror in the great Table Mountain Tunnel case at Sonora, Tuolumne County, California. It was Table Mountain Tunuel vs. New York Tunnel. The opposing ed a semi-circle.

Table Mountain is a wall 40 miles long, from 200 to 300 feet in height, about 800 yards wide, and with a top as level as a barn door. Sides, top and bottom are of rock and in the middle is a core of gold-bearing gravel. In some claims the tunnels bored through the "run rock" are 1,400 feet in length and cost years of labor. The top rock is volcanic and spongy in appearance. The bottom is a hard blue granite, worn smooth by the rush of a current, for at some period it was the bed of a river.
