Last Tuesday a prairie fire originated on the farm of W. E. Jackson, southwest of town, and the wind being in the south, it swept north at a furious rate, endangering some of the dwellings in the west part of town. Numbers of men and women turned out to stay its progress and by hard fighting the east line of fire burning toward town was subdued. Had the wind shifted to a point a little west of south, no power under Heaven could have saved Red Cloud from being laid in ashes.

There is some talk of a proposition being submitted to the voters of this school district to vote bonds for the erection of a new school house. To us it would seem that it would be better to pay for the old one before building new, but we have taken the pains to get the views of a majority of the heaviest tax-payers, on the subject, and find that they are almost unanimously in favor of voting bonds to the extent of \$5,000 and erecting a good and substantial school house. There are a few, however, who are in favor of adding a debt of \$10,000 to \$12,000 upon the district. This we think would be folly, first, because the requirements of the district does not demand it, and secondly, because the bonds for the old school house are still unpaid. We have no doubt that those most interested will arrange the matter satisfactorily to all.
