THE GUNS OF SUMMER.

The Victim that Dies in Their Wreathing Smoke. H. G. Ingersoll's Indianapolis Speech.

The past rises before me like a dream. Again we are in the great struggle for national life. We hear the sounds of preparation—the music of the hoarse drums—the silver voices of heroic bagpipes. We see thousands of assemblages and hear the appeals of orators; we see the pale cheeks of woman and the flushed faces of men; and in those assemblages we see all the dead whose dust we have covered with flowers.

We see them all as they march proudly away under the fluttering flags, keeping time to the wild grand music of war—marching down the streets of glory, to do and die for the eternal right.

We are with them in the prisons of hatred and famine; but human speech can never tell what they endured. We are at home when the news comes that they are dead. We see the maiden in the shadow of her first sorrow. We see the silvered head of the old man bowed with the last grief.

The past rises before us, and we see four millions of human beings governed by the lash—we see them bound hand and foot—we hear the strokes of cruel whips—we see the bounds tracking women through tangled swamps. We see the babes sold from the breasts of mothers. Cruelly unpeppable! Outrage infinite!

Four million bodies in chains—four million souls in fetters. All are sacred relations of wife, mother, father and child are trampled beneath the brutal feet of might. And all this was done under our own beautiful banner of the free.

The past rises before us. We hear the roar and the shriek of the bursting shell. The broken letters fall. These heroes die. We look. Instead of slaves we see men, and woman, and children. The wand of progress touches the auction-block, the slave pen, the whipping-post, and we see homes, and firesides, and school houses, and books, and where all was want, and crime and cruelty, and fetters, we see the faces of the free.

These heroes are dead. They died for liberty—they died for us. They are at rest. They sleep in the land they made free, under the flag they rendered stainless, under the solemn pines and sad hemlocks, the teal willows and the embracing vines. They sleep beneath the shadow of the clouds, careless alike of the sunshine or of storm, each in the windowless palace of rest. Earth may run red with other wars—they are at peace. In the midst of battles, in the roar of conflict, they found the serenity of death. I have one sentiment for the soldiers living and dead—cheers for the living and tears for the dead.

Two convicts in the penitentiary from Wyoming Territory, engaged in a fight one day last week, and according to the Lincoln Journal, would not desist until fired upon several times by the guard, and one named O'Brien fatally wounded. They are both said to be bad men. This circumstance leads us to remark that it seems a little strange that whenever a convict who is considered a "dangerous character" is confined in that penitentiary he is very soon shot and killed upon some pretext or other.

There has been considerable excitement manifested in the towns between Beatrice and Red Cloud during the past week. The presence of Chief Engineer Ainsworth, between the points with his surveying party has caused a ripple of excitement, but the climax was scarcely reached when nothing could be seen or heard of them. No doubt the B. & M. intend to build the line between Brownville and Red Cloud to the east line of Nekecks county, the present season as Mr. Touzalin has himself said. But the exact line is a matter of deep interest to almost every citizen on the route, and to be kept in suspense is exasperating.

Proving Up Homesteads. Hereafter all persons wishing to prove up on homesteads will have to comply with the following law, approved March 3d, 1879.

It is enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, that before final proof shall be submitted by any person claiming to enter agricultural lands under the laws providing for preemption or homestead entries, such person shall file with the register of the proper land office a notice of his or her intention to make such proof, stating therein the description of lands to be entered, and the names of the witnesses by whom the necessary facts will be established.

Upon the filing of such notice, the register shall publish a notice, that such application has been made, once a week for the period of thirty days, in a newspaper to be by him designated as published nearest to such land, and he shall also post such notice in some conspicuous place in his office for the same period. Such notice shall contain the names of the witnesses as stated in the application. At the expiration of said period of thirty days, the claimant shall be entitled to make proof in the manner heretofore provided by law. The Secretary of the Interior shall make all necessary rules for giving effect to the foregoing provisions. Approved March 3d, 1879.

The census returns of Nebraska, for the year ending April 30, 1879, will foot up 475,000.

A band of Omaha Indians sold twelve wagon loads of nicely hewn fence posts at West Point last week.

Martin Brothers, of LaPorte, sold last week 1029 pounds of wool at 16 cents per pound. A Sioux City firm got it.

The lightning twisted a rod entirely out of the ground for a man in Cuming county the other day—a doubtful story.

Ira Olive, brother to the man-burner, I. P. Olive, has lately been chosen captain of the Loup and Wood river round up.

One day last week a Schuyler merchant shipped east 1200 dozen of eggs, and 1600 pounds of butter of Nebraska production.

The boiler in the steam saw-mill at Cincinnati, Pawnee county, exploded last week, resulting in considerable damage. No one killed.

Pawnee county will boast of as fine public buildings as any county of twice its population in the state when its new court house is completed.

Cut worms are making sad havoc with vegetables and corn in some parts of the state, and together with gophers are seriously injuring crops in many places.
