THOMAS L. BISHOP, one of the oldest engineers on the B. & M., fell from his engine at the company's yard in Plattsmouth last Saturday and was run over by the cars and killed.

It is the opinion of city attorney Anderson, of Omaha, that the new high license law annuls all licenses issued under the old law as soon as it goes into effect, which is on the 15th of June.

HENRY STOKER, a Burt county stock man while on his way to Chicago with two or three car loads of cattle, fell through the railroad bridge at Plattsmouth to the ice below, sustaining injuries that will prove fatal.

W. C. B. ALLEN, Esq., of Omaha, has stepped to the front with a special privilege of a thoroughbred short-horn bull or heifer (as the winner desires) for the Nebraska boy who shall raise the most corn on one acre of ground during the season of 1881.

Sapped lastly in the breast. The feat was over, the long fought battle of the campaign had culminated in placing a royal chaplet on the brow of one divinely chosen because he was the Nation's choice.

The Sabbath following was a bright, beautiful day, and church goers, determined to see and hear the best that the Capitol afforded. Several thousand determined to worship in the little Campbellite church where President Garfield has every Sabbath worshipped during his long service in Congress.

To put 5,000 into a space that would hold less than 300 when packed like sardines was no mean feat for the good natured ushers, and the crowd scattered, and many of them to other churches.

The church was packed to overflowing with near 2,000 worshippers. This church has the best arranged audience room, and the largest organ in the city Doctor J. W. Bischoff the celebrated blind organist and music composer presides at the organ and conducts the music, which is notably unequalled in any city.

The Columbia Mannerchor celebrated their fourth anniversary last week. Grand Island is destined to grow more this season than in any previous year.

A new station will be established between Pawnee City and Blue Springs. A church, school house and new bank are prospective improvements in Hubbell.

Amos C. Fox, of Albion, was found stricken to death on the prairie on the last week of the month.

A permanent fair ground is talked of by the Washington County Agricultural society. The loss of sheep will not be as great in the Republican valley as was expected.

The citizens of Oxford are moving toward building a bridge across the river at that place. Sixty barrels of alcohol is manufactured daily by the Nebraska City brewing company.

A Dakota county stock dealer recently sold a car load of cattle which averaged 1,370 pounds each. It is supposed that under the new license law requiring \$500 license, Columbus will have four saloons.

It is estimated that a loss of \$2,000,000 in stock will be the result of the unusually severe winter. A fence in Blue last week resulted in the stabbing of Frank Sutton by John Turner. Turner escaped.

A movement to secure a telegraph office in the business portion of the city is in operation in Hastings. Nebraska City is certain that the near future will see a railroad bridge across the Missouri at her banks.

Seven two-story brick business houses are to be built on the corner of Seventh and Ninth streets, in Lincoln. The cigar factory at Indianola is in full blast, and supplies the trade west of that place with a good article.

A Mr. Strickler, whose home was three miles from Lincoln, fell dead last week while unloading coal at the yard. The stone of which the Franklin academy will be erected is in an immense quarry two miles south of town.

The Omaha and Winnebago Indians are being supplied with 2,500 bushels of seed wheat for spring sowing. A fire last week in Albion destroyed \$10,000 of property. The remainder of the town narrowly escaped.

One D. W. Fuller, who is supposed to have fired a gun and blown in Lincoln, in 1879, was arrested in Lincoln, indicted and jailed. Will White and Chris Hartman of the State board of agriculture, are laying out a large stock farm on the Blackhawk in the county.

An engine and four cars at Nebraska City had a narrow escape from jumping the transfer bed and precipitating themselves in the river. The Nebraska City Hydraulic Gas Light and Coke company have entered suit against the city of Nebraska City for \$51,000 for breach of contract.

Brownville merchants have appointed a committee to see what steps are necessary to secure a railroad bridge across the Missouri at that point. Several gentlemen of Tecumseh have provided themselves with hollow walking canes, in which may be concealed a pint of whiskey or other stimulant.

Burt county was organized by act of the territorial legislature February 18th, 1855. The town site of Tolamah was located October 6th, 1854. Deuster town site was located in 1855. Tolamah was incorporated by act of the legislature approved March 14th, 1856.

Milton Elliot, who resides seven miles south of town, has found petroleum oil on his farm. He began to bore for water and near the surface struck slate, and at a depth of forty-five feet found petroleum oil. The hole in which the oil is found bores very freely.—[Superior Guide.]

Albion is to have a military company. Lincoln is finally to have a street railway. Beatrice has a woman's suffrage association.

Immigration has begun in Johnson county. Strumling is in need of one good attorney.

Humboldt is in need of some additional dwelling houses. Endicott has 105 inhabitants, two on one street dwelling.

Superior suffered \$10,000 damage by the rise of the Republican. A lodge of the Knights of Pythias has been organized at Byrnes.

The river at Alma during the freshet was nearly two miles wide. Nebraska City's telephone company will shortly begin operations.

The Platte river is higher than ever known before in twenty years. One hundred grists were brought to the mill one day last week.

A sled drawn by a team of eight created a sensation recently in Beatrice. A colony of Germans will soon locate on the Blue, south of Davonport.

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Church Hove was hanged in effigy on Grove Tuesday, at West Point. A new station will be established between Pawnee City and Blue Springs.

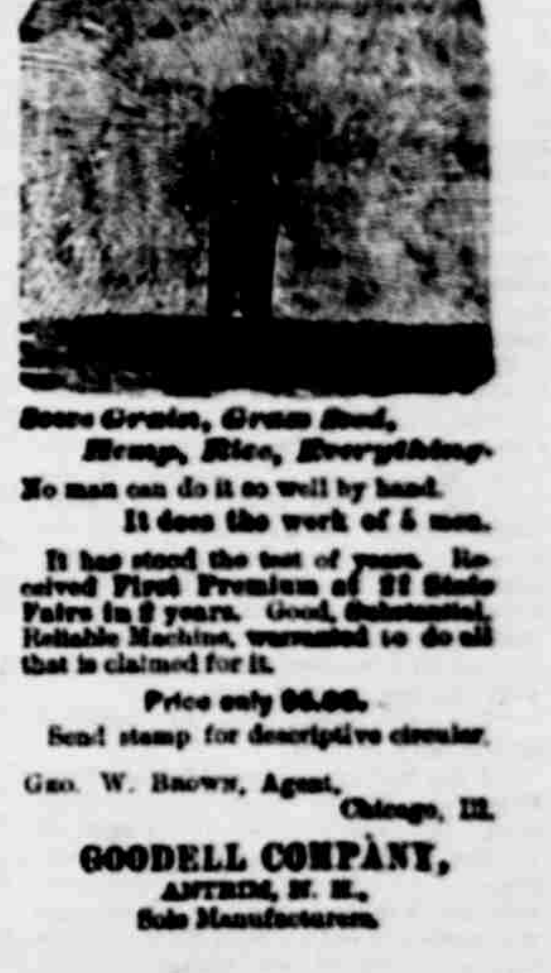
