## WHO WAS RIGHT.

The long talked of investigation has

begun. The commissioners have se-

cured the services of a Mr. Thomas

of Lincoln, a reputed expert, and com-

menced an examination of the county

records. It perhaps may be consid-

ered out of place to say anything

about the matter at this time, and we

would not were it not for the fact that

the editor of this paper has been per-

sistently misrepresented, vilified and

lied about by the same party and his

allies whose official actions are now

being investigated. It has been re-

peatedly asserted that the CHIEF

raised the cry of fraud in county man-

agement for political purposes and

through personal spite. Recent de-

velopments show that these reports

were false and that the CHIEF has

for the last three years been on the

right trail. We propose, in this article,

to show to our readers that such is the

case, and then drop the subject, per-

haps until the investigation is com-

pleted.

The report of the Ex-Com. Clerk as

published this week in the commission-

ers' proceedings shows that the sur-

plus funds were turned into the treas-

ury by the clerk. This is not a fact.

After Mr. Tulley has retired from

office, and during the month of Janu-

ary, the county commissioners so far

investigated his accounts as to make

the discovery that he had not turned

over to the treasurer certain moneys

that belonged to the county, and they

made to Mr. Tulley a request that he

appear and pay the money over, which

he did, the 14th day of the present

month, amounting in all, for the

years 1880 and 1881, to the sum of

\$852.79. It is not our wish to contin-

ue a fight on Mr. Tulley's, and nothing

can be farther from our intentions

at the present time, but it is due to

ourselves, after being lied about by Mr.

Tulley and some of his backers, show-

ing that we have been right all these

years and that him and some of his

supporters, though most of the latter

innocently, have been wrong. The

law requires that the county clerk

shall turn into the treasury of the

county, at the end of every three

months, all money in excess of his

salary received by him in fees &c.

This the late county clerk failed to do

during the last two years, as recent

developments show, but carried the

money away with him, and the ques-

tion naturally arises, how has it been

for the last eight years? Mr. Jones

also turned in between two and three

hundred dollars at a recent meeting

of the county board.

Did we wish, which we certainly do

not, to make light on Mr. Tulley, and

were we actuated by the same vindic-

tive and hell-born malignity that has

characterized the actions of certain

of this clique towards us, we might go

on and make comparisons that possi-

bly might be odious. We might ask

the question publicly which has been

asked by different parties more than

fifty times recently, viz: What is the

difference between the crimes of Jos.

Gaessler and J. A. Tulley. The one

carried money away from the bank

that did not belong to him; the other

carried money away from the court

house, as has been proven, did not

belong to him. Did they not both

know that the money did not

belong to them. The one is under

arrest and undergoing a criminal pro-

secution, the other is free as the air we

breathe. The one has friends who

palliate and smooth over his actions.

## Arrested for Embezzlement.

This community was somewhat

startled by the report of the arrest of

Jo. Gaessler last Saturday night on

the charge of embezzlement. Mr.

Gaessler entered the employ of Smith

Bros., bankers, about two years ago as

clerk and collector, and had by strict

attention to business gained the confi-

dence of the members of the firm, but

in an evil hour he yielded to tempta-

tion and fell. It is the old story of

appropriating money for specula-

tion or fast living, followed by detec-

tion and arrest. Shortly after his ar-

rest he made a confession to Mr. S. C.

Smith acknowledging the embezze-

ment of \$200 which, Mr. Smith is

satisfied will cover the entire amount

taken. The first appropriation was

made last December, when \$500 was

taken, but suspicion was not aroused

until quite recently when certain

movements on the part of Mr. Gaes-

ler, though trifling at first, led to a

partial examination of his books

which revealed the fact that he was

not as he should be, and accordingly

he was sent on a business trip to Bart

Oak, Kansas, to allow of a thorough

examination of his accounts, and upon
