

STRAW LUMBER.

In the coming scarcity of lumber invention must supply the deficiency, and already paper pulp and other matarials are sometimes used as substitute. The American Architect has the following on the use of straw for

this purpose: There can be no question but what straw lumber is admirably adapted to many kinds of finishing work tables table and counter tops, fine doors, and ornamental work, and we are assured that it can be produced and sold in competition with the finer grades of pine or in competition with wide walnut, at about one-half the price of the latter. The standard manufacturer is in widths of thirty two inches, a length of twelve feet, and a thickness corresponding to that of surfaced boards These dimensions may be varied to suit such orders as may be given, and embrace any width, length, or thickness. Unlike lumber, However, narrower widths are the most costly. The straw lumber may be ripped with the hand saw, or the buzz-saw; may be run through the sticker for the manufacture of mouldings, and takes a nail


