FRIDAY, JANUARY 12 1883. OUR WASHINGTON LETTER.

WASHINGTON, JAN. 1, 1883. The first of January is a very busy day in Washington. It has been the custom for nearly ninety years for the President to hold a levee on this day, and, of late years, the presidential receptions have been supplemented by Cabinet and other receptions. Nearly everybody who pretends to be in society, or that aspires to get into it, calls on New Year's. The Washington newspapers publish in advance a long list of the names and addresses of the ladies who will receive. In these lists the names of the wives of Cabinet officers, and of the acknowledged leaders of society and fashion, are seen in democratic proximity to the names of Mrs. Ince, who keeps a pawn shop, and Mrs. Jones, whose husband has a livery stable. The President's reception was a very successful affair if the number of callers is the measure of success. It is estimated that he has shaken hands with at least five thousand persons of every race, color, and condition. The first in order of the official etiquette of the occasion were the Cabinet Ministers, Justices of the supreme court, the Diplomatic Corps, Senators and Representatives in Congress, officers of different departments. These were followed by the crowd who had been in waiting for their shake at the gates of White House grounds. The scene in the parlors and halls of the presidential mansion during the earlier part of the reception was almost dazzling in its brilliancy. The foreign ministers and the attaches of legation were in the court uniform of their gilt buttons and gorgeous sashes enabled the gentlemen for once to outshine the ladies in the vanity of dress. The President was assisted at his reception by the ladies of the cabinet, the wife and daughter of General McLellan, and the wives of some democratic as well as some republican senators. The recent improvements in the decorating and refurbishing the White House were much admired by and approved by such professors of taste as we have. I do not describe the dresses of the ladies. I know they will be mad, but not as mad as they would be if they should read my effort in this line.

Now that the holidays are over, it is thought, will be improved by constant work with few, if any, adjournments. Three of the regular appropriation bills have now been passed by both Houses of Congress, viz: The Indian

and Consular and Diplomatic, and the agricultural bills. They still require action by the House of Representatives, however, upon various senate amendments increasing their amount slightly. The house has also passed the military academy and the Postal Appropriation bills. The Postal bill as passed by the house, authorizes a total expenditure during the next fiscal year of \$44,218,520 (which is less than the estimated postal revenues for the same period) and the total of the Military Academy bill is \$305,657. The Army bill now pending in the House provides for a total appropriation of \$24, 681,500.

The department estimates for other bills now in course of preparation by the house appropriations committee are in amount as follows. For pensions, \$10,575,000; for fortifications, \$1,000,000; for the navy, \$23,481,078; for legislative, executive, and judicial expenses, \$21,840,170; for sundry civil expenditures, \$34,186,576; for the District of Columbia, \$175,143. The pensions, fortifications, and navy bills are ready for report to the house. After these there will remain for preparation the general deficiency bill, for which no definite estimates can be made, and a possible River and Harbor bill.

PARIS LETTER. PARIS, FRANCE, DEC. 23, 1882. I have reason to believe that the attention of the Powers will shortly be drawn to the Suez Canal. It is the intention of the Egyptian Government to secure a predominant share in the administration of the great Egyptian waterway with the least possible delay. According to the convention signed in 1876 between M. De Lesseps on the one hand and Messrs. Stokes, Stander and the other, the Suez Canal company agreed to spend one million francs annually for keeping the canal in good order. Traffic has however, since increased in unexpected proportions that important improvements have become urgent, if navigation by that route is to suffer no interruption. The company has consequently resolved to devote one hundred million francs to that purpose. The English Government, although willing to leave the technical execution of the work required to the Suez Canal Company, nevertheless insists that the improvements should be carried out in accordance with plans to be furnished by England.

On Sunday next Metz will elect a deputy to the Reichstag, in the room of the late M. Beckmann. The sole candidate, it appears is M. Antoine, like the predecessor a thoroughgoing frenchman in every sense of the word. "Hand in hand with all the other deputies of the Alsace-Lorraine party of protest; I shall affirm," says M. Antoine in his address, "that the annexation has trampled underfoot our rights as free men and citizens. I shall repeat to our conquerors—whose rule of

conduct has been too to the vanquished—what I told them on Dec. 9, 1881, namely, 'In spite of all you can do there will remain to us what you can never take from us—Hope. We shall tell our people to wait; for above your intrigues there is the majesty of right and justice. Dignity, independence, devotion—these are my devices which will sustain me until the day when right prevails over might.' Commentary over the above M. Edmond About's organ, the Dix Neuvie-me Siecle remarks to-day.

Happily we are living at a time when nothing can be founded on conquest, and we can foresee that the annexation of Alsace and Arraigu will certainly not last. How will Attaine and Alsace regain possession of their national rights, which for twelve years have been taken from them. We know not. But this we do know, that destiny will sooner or later restore this French country to France, and that this same destiny will find its own way, whether it be warlike or peaceable.

It has long been notorious that all the wine made or concocted in France is not French wine. Many will, however, be surprised to learn that in the land of the vine, the costs of imports, chiefly from Spain, exceeds the total received for imports to the whole world. The quantity derived from the kingdom of Aliforra this year has nearly equalled the total exported from French ports or sent across the land frontiers. During the first ten months of 1882 France paid no less, in round numbers, than ten million eight hundred thousand pounds sterling for wines coming from abroad; whereas she received only eight million three hundred thousand for the amount sent out of the country.
