Educational Notes.
CHAS W SPRINGER, CO SUFF.
Dist No 14—This school is being
taught by Miss F. Conrad. It is her
first term. She has twenty three pu-
pils, three of them over sixteen years
of age. Two pupils are advancing
well in arithmetic. A uniformity of
text books is an imperative necessity
in this school. We hope the teacher
and school will be mutually pleased
this winter.
Dist No 22—School is taught by
Miss Millie Vineyard. The school
house is comfortable and warm. Twen-
ty three pupils attend school, seven
being over sixteen years of age. Not-
withstanding a diversity of text books
Miss V. has only twenty recitations a
day, ten each half day. She has a class
of eight pupils in history. The school
will close March 8th.
Dist No 24—This school began Aug-
ust 25th 1882 and will close about
Feb 22nd. Miss Nannie Smith has
taught the school very satisfactorily.
Twenty three pupils in attendance.
Miss Smith's methods of teaching are
good and are to be commended. One
study history. Her system of keep-
ing reports has a good influence upon
the school.
Dist No 25—This school is taught
by W. W. Westfall. He has twenty
four pupils, four of them over sixteen
years of age. A lack of books is a
drawback to improvement in this
school. When will our districts wake
up to the idea that books of a proper
kind and amount are, as necessary in
the school room as machinery on the
farm? He has a class in physiology
and two are advancing well in arith-
metic.

Dist No 26—This school closed
January 26, and was taught by Miss
Edith Dean, who, after closing, imme-
diately took to herself a Cooper, hence
we do not know whether we shall re-
ceive the benefit of her teaching any-
more or not. She had twelve pupils,
one over sixteen years of age. The
scholars have been punctual in their
attendance which speaks well for the
interest in the school. The district
needs a better house and black board
etc.
Dist No 29—This school began in
September and will close in March.
Miss Rosa Hawley teaches here, hav-
ing twenty six pupils in attendance,
three over sixteen. There is no uni-
formity of books in the district, and
there sixteen recitations in reading
alone. Pupils have not attended regu-
larly as they should, and the severe
weather has been a cause of some re-
maining out of school. We find Fel-
ter's, French's, Ray's, Davies' and
Robinson's arithmetics in this school,
Guyot's, Monteth's, and Warren's ge-
ographies; Hillard's, Sander's and Mc-
Guffey's readers. Our sympathies are
for the teacher, and if she had not a
great deal of patience, she must be
well schooled by this time.

Dist No 31—This school is taught
by Miss Mary McCallum. She has
thirty pupils, four over sixteen years
of age. The teacher is much engaged
in her school and tries to make it in-
teresting. The pupils are well ad-
vanced in arithmetic and there are
two classes in history.
Dist No 33—Mr. J. W. Burrows
teaches in this district a two month's
term. He has many classes from his
eighteen pupils, two over sixteen. He
has "about all kinds" of readers. This
district needs better accommodations
for its children. They can not make
good progress in a cold house, with
no facilities for teaching, and scarcely
two books alive. Won't this book
question get interesting by the time
for the annual meeting?
