VICTOR The Republican Candidate Downs the Democratic Rooster



Massachusetts, New York, Pennsylvania, Connecticut, Kansas, Nebraska have been redeemed. The Republicans having united and carried the states named above with decisive majorities. Ben Butler, the gagging governor of Massachusetts, was covered up with a mass drift of Republican votes. Selah! He had never failed to elect him. This victory feels happy over the grand rout of Tuesday's election, and can be so clear for 1884.

The democrats carried four out of the eleven states which held elections on Tuesday last, viz: Maryland, Mississippi, New Jersey and Virginia. Nebraska whole into line with increased Republican majorities, by electing Hon. M. B. Reese, superintendent and democratic nominee.

Webster county elected the entire ticket, with the exception of sheriff. Mr. Jos. Warren, independent candidate defeated Henry C. Scott the regular nominee of the Republican party. The fight in Webster county centered largely on the office of sheriff, the friends of both gentlemen working like Turks all day. We are sorry of Mr. Scott's defeat, but bow to the will of the people. Recognizing the sources from whence cometh every good and perfect gift, it is right and proper that the citizens of this commonwealth should offer their most grateful thanks to Him who hath in the past dealt so bountifully with them.

The President of the United States has designated Thursday, the 29th day of November, as a day as National Thanksgiving, and in harmony therewith I, James W. Dawes, governor of the state of Nebraska, do hereby commend to the people of this state that the day so appointed be observed as a day of Thanksgiving and prayer to Almighty God.

Manifold have been our blessings. Let us, so far as practicable, refrain from secular pursuits on that day, and gathering in our accustomed places of worship render our human thanks for the mercies and blessings that have been showered upon us during the year, and invoke a continuance of the Divine favor.

In the midst of the general rejoicing we should remember the poor and the needy. "Blessed is he that considereth the poor." In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand, and caused to be affixed the Great Seal of the State of Nebraska.

Done at Lincoln, this fifth day of November, in the year of our Lord One Thousand Eight Hundred and Eighty Three, of this state of the seventh, and of the Independence of the United States the One Hundred and Eighty.
