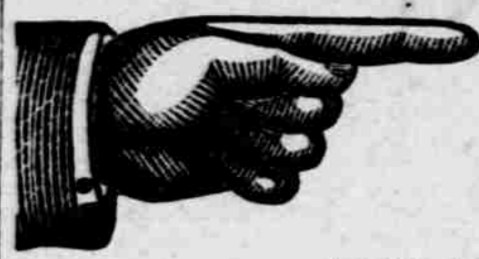

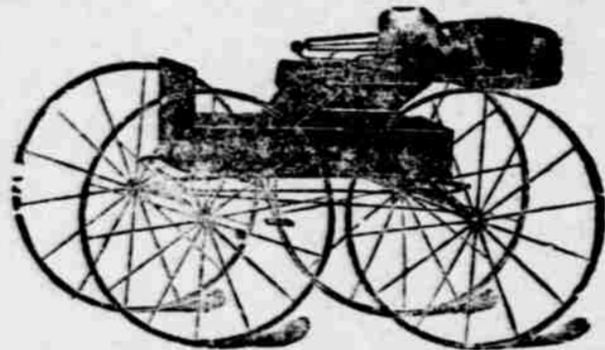

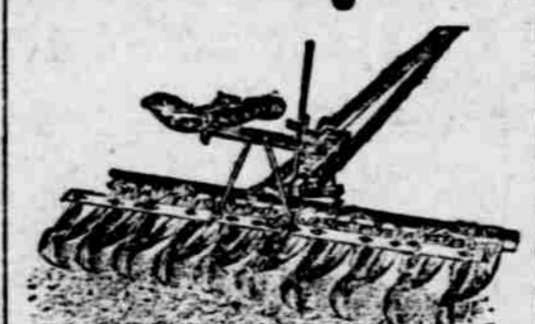

331f ROAD NOTICE.

STATE OF NEBRASKA, WEBSTER COUNTY. To all to whom it may concern: The commissioner appointed to view and report upon certain lines of roads to be vacated and relocated as prayed for in a certain petition duly signed, presented and filed with the county clerk of said county, as follows: "Commencing at the section corner of sections 27, 28, 29, and 30, township 3 Range 11 in Webster county, Nebraska, and vacate the road known as the Red Cloud and Kearney road, running north from said corner through sections 28, 29, 30, and 31, in said town 3, Range 11, and relocate and establish said road on the section lines between said sections 28, 29, 30, and 31, and on the west of said proposed road, and on the east of said proposed road, running thence west along the north line of section 30 aforesaid, to intersect the road as formerly platted, in Webster county, Nebraska," has reported favorable, and recommends the vacation, and establishment of said lines of roads as prayed for in said petition. And all objections thereto, or claims for damages, must be filed in the county clerk's office, on or before noon of the 22nd day of March, A. How Watch Cases are Made.

The Tariff.

It is now generally known that reduction of the national debt for February was much smaller than usual, amounting as it did to not more than \$2,582,587. There is an explanation offered for this and it is that an unusually large amount was required from the treasury for pensions. But as the average reduction of the preceding months of the fiscal year would make the annual extinguishment for 1883 over \$100,000,000, there is no reason for complaint of the February statement. The free-trade journals complain that it shows no reduction whatever, the Herald, which has become the principal organ of European manufacturers and New York importers, assuming that the sooner "the rapid extinguishment of the debt is stopped the better." The government, it says, has established its ability to manage an enormous debt, and, having done that, congress should provide for leaving the debt alone, which is to say, to let it hang like a great weight upon the country, and only in order that "commerce with foreign nations shall be restricted as little as possible by protective duties." Our esteemed contemporary should have learned by this time that protective duties are levied not only for revenue, but for protecting itself, and that they are now serving the double duty of extinguishing the debt, without the people being directly taxed for reduction, and of protecting our manufacturers and workmen—the former in their profits, the latter in their wages. Because duties on foreign goods are doing this admirable double service, the country has at the present time no intention whatever to remove or even to reduce them. It is quite satisfied that they shall be utilized for a while longer (1) to protect our native industries, (2) to extinguish the debt, and (3) to pay the pensions of the brave men who fought to perpetuate the union. When protection shall no longer be necessary, when the debt shall be paid, and when the pension list shall be reduced, the country will probably consider the question of tariff reduction. At present it will not.—Omaha Republican.
