GOVERNMENT AID. The steamers Vidalia and Jno. G. Fisher and some thirty barges are at Wilson's Point and in readiness if it becomes necessary to use them for that purpose. Mr. Copple, United States Assistant Engineer, goes up by the Anchor line steamer in the morning to inspect and direct the necessary repairs to levees in the vicinity of Omega, Madison Parish, La.


