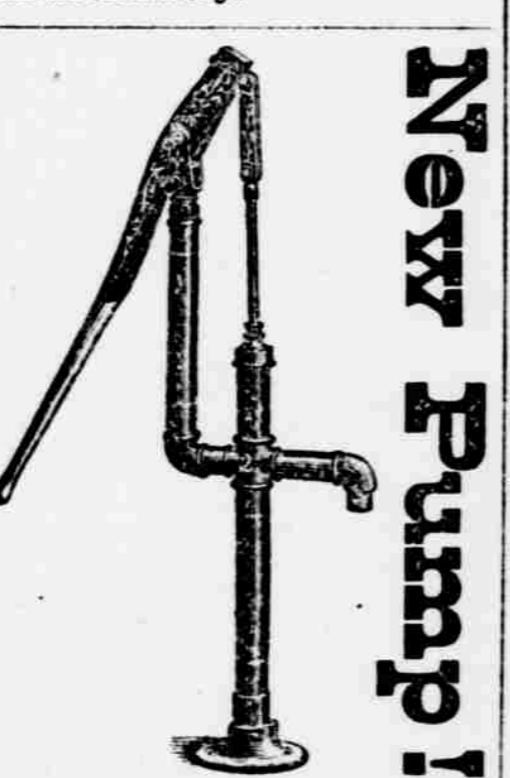
**LEGAL NOTICE.**
