ROAD NOTICE.

STATE OF NEBRASKA, WEBSTER COUNTY.

To all whom it may concern: The commissioner appointed to view and report upon certain lines of roads to be vacated and relocated as prayed for in a certain petition duly signed, presented and filed with the county clerk of said county, as follows: "Commencing at the section corner of sections 27, 28, 33 and 34, township 3, range 11 in Webster county, Nebraska, and vacate the road known as the Red Cloud and Kearney road, running north from said corner through sections 28, 27, 16 and 9, in said town 3, range 11, and relocate and establish said road on the section lines between said sections 28, 27, 16 and 9, and on the west of said proposed road and across sections 27, 16 and 9 in said town 3, range 11, and relocate and establish said road on the east of said proposed road, running thence west along the north line of sec 29 aforesaid, to intersect the road as formerly platted, in Webster county, Nebraska," has reported favorable to this exception, that said line of road to be relocated on said section line, instead of running north between said sections 27 and 16, town 3, range 11, to stop at the section corner between sections 9, 10, 15 and 16, of said town and range, running thence west along the north line of said section 16 aforesaid to the section corner of sections 8, 9, 16 and 17, thence running north between sections 8 and 9, to section corner between 4, 5, 8 and 9, of said town and range to intersect the road as formerly platted and on record in the clerk's office of said county, and recommending the vacation and establishment of said lines of roads as above set forth. And all objections thereto or claims for damages, must be filed in the county clerk's office, on or before noon of the 25th day of July, 1884, or such roads will be vacated and established without reference thereto.

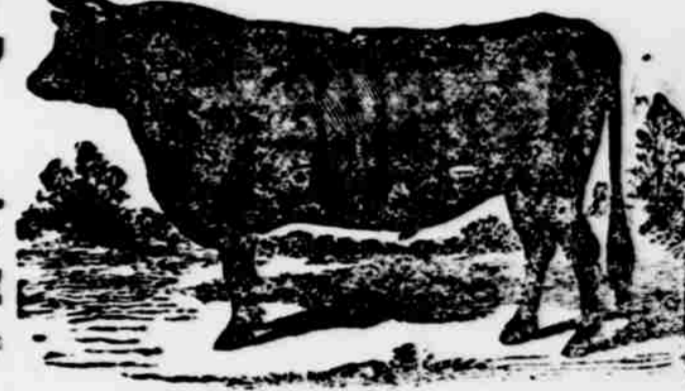
