

PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS, a joint resolution was adopted by the Legislathre of the State of Nebraska, at the eighteenth session thereof, and approved February 27. A. D. 1883, proposing an amend-ment to section four (4) of article three [3] of the constitution of said state, and that said section as amended shall read as follows to-wit:

"Section 4-The term of office of members Section 4—The term of once of members of the legislature shall be two years, and they shall each receive a salary of three hundred dollars for their services during said term, and ten cents for every mile they shall travel in going to and retarning from the place of meeting of the legislature, on the most usual route. Provided, however that neither members of the legislature nor employees shall receive any pay or pequisi-ties other than their salary and mileage. Each

tics other than their salary and nileage. Each session, except special sessions, shall be not less than sixty days. After the expiration of forty days of the session no bills nor joint resolutions of the nature of bills shall be introduced, unless the governor shall, by special message, call the attention of the legislature to the necessity of passing a law on the subject matter embraced in the message, and the introduction of bills shall be restricted thereto." The ballots at the election at which said amendment shall be submitted shall be in the following form: "For proposed Amendment to the Constitution relating to Legislative Depart-ment."
