CURRENT COMMENT.

DEFECTIVE sidewalks have cost Des Moines \$24,000 in four years through damages to pedestrians.

THE British gave to Mete Kingi a military funeral because, as a New Zealand chief, he had afforded valuable support to the Government at a critical juncture in the history of its rule.

Among vegetable petrifactions from Arizona are moss agates in which the field is colorless crystal and the imprisoned matter brilliant red, green, gray and brown. They are found in large pieces.

INTELLIGENT and systematic attention to physical culture in colleges, instead of permitting the students to continue their sports in an indiscriminate manner, is advocated by President Robinson of Brown University.

It is proposed by some English engineers and capitalists to connect the Baltie and Black Seas by means of a canal from the Danube near Vienna to the Oder near Breslau. The distance is about two hundred miles.

In several of the counties of England the gentry have moved successfully against the licensing of liquor booths at horse races, and the rumsellers have retaliated by killing off all the foxes, so that the sport of hunting is spoiled.

The handkerchief is now being used to familiarize Russians with the history of their
