It does seem proper that the state fair should be held at Lincoln, or some point further west. It is got right for the people of the extreme west part of the state to be compelled to go clear to Omaha to attend the state fair. The east part of the state is not entitled to everything.

Blaine and Logan.

From all parts of the country comes the encouraging news that Blaine and Logan are being received by the masses with the greatest enthusiasm. This is evidence that the laboring classes and others who want a good government are still in favor of voting and fighting side by side for the one great object i. e. the election of the republican standard bearers. The enthusiasm is unbounded, and if we mistake not, Blaine and Logan will receive the unanimous support of American people November 4. Let every republican stand by the ticket and vote for Blaine and Logan, vote for Gov. Dawes and the state ticket, and lastly vote for James Laird for congress, J. B. Skinner, for senator, J. L. Kaley for Gov., D. P. Newcomer for representative, and I B Hampton for commissioner, and success will be ours.

There is kicking against Cleveland in the south as well as in the north. Colonel John S. Swan, an ex-confederate of West Virginia, is out in a card announcing his reasons for supporting Blaine and Logan. Heretofore the Colonel has boasted of being an unconstructed rebel and a Bourbon of the first water, but he cannot stomach Cleveland's nomination, or the party platform. He arraigns the Democratic members of Congress for raising to put our navy on a footing with those of other countries, and says that they are neither statesmen, patriots, or men endowed with common sense. He also denounces Democratic opposition to a protective tariff, and calls upon his army comrades and the young men of the south to come out and take a stand in defense of the principles advocated by the republican party. In closing his letter Colonel Swan declares that the democratic party of to-day is not the party of twenty-five years ago, and says that the republican party has become the Whig party of old under a different name. He eulogizes Blaine as a fearless and just man, endowed with those "large views that mark the statesman above all technicalities."—Cleveland Leader.

Mr. STICKLE, or as many of the confusion organs persist in calling him, "Stickle," is rapidly proving his incapacity and demagoguery in his speech to the people of the second district. He takes occasion to denounce Mr. Laird for his vote against the Reagan bill. He takes it for granted as a demagogue always does, that his audience is ignorant and cannot appreciate the animus and interest of the Reagan bill which was framed for the purpose of building up the commerce of Galveston by cutting off the transcontinental trade with New York, Boston, Baltimore, and Philadelphia. It provided that railroads should be compelled to charge pro rata according to the length of the haul. This was to prevent the shipping of western freights to eastern ports at a rate per mile less than should be charged for the same classes of freights originating near those ports. In case it had passed eastern shippers would have had their goods hauled for next to nothing and the roads would have been compelled to charge prices for Nebraska and Kansas products that would have destroyed the profits of farming in this country. It is only necessary to read the Reagan bill to a Nebraska farmer to convince him that Stickle is either a knave or a fool. Even Rosewater has been compelled by the march of intelligence to drop the Reagan bill argument.

The only reason Stickle advocates it is that it is generally supposed to be "ferocious the railroads," and he thinks that is all that is known about it by the anti-monops of the Second district. But it can only hurt the railroads by striking them through the farmers of the west. The railroads would really be glad to have such a bill, if it would not freeze out the farmers of the west for it would force them to treble the rates they now charge for long hauls, and relieve them of the responsibility of having raised the rates of their own that it would eventually be

LEGAL NOTICE
THE VOTERS OF WEBSTER COUNTY Nebraska, are hereby notified that at the general election to be held on the 10th day of November, 1884, the following question will be submitted by an order of the board of commissioners of Webster county, adopted at its meeting October 21st, 1884:
"Shall the county commissioners of Webster county, Nebraska, issue the bonds of said county in the sum of five hundred thousand dollars, dated January 1st, 1885, due January 1st, 1886, with coupon for annual interest attached to each of said bonds at seven per cent. per annum, payable on the 1st day of January, 1885, and each year thereafter until 1890, and sell the same so that the proceeds therefrom shall be applied to the erection of buildings upon and otherwise improving the poor farm of said county? And shall the commissioners of said county levy in the year 1885 and each year thereafter a tax of one-half mill on the dollar valuation or as large a part thereof as may be necessary to pay the annual interest on said bonds in excess of the fifteen mills which they are now authorized to levy? And shall the commissioners of said county in the year 1885 levy a tax of two mills on the dollar valuation or as large a part thereof as may be necessary to pay the amount of principal and interest to become due January 1st, 1886, in excess of the five mills which they are now authorized to levy?"
Those voting in favor of said proposition will have written or printed upon their ballots the words "For Poor House Bonds." Those voting against said proposition will have written on their ballots the words "Against Poor House Bonds."
