> Gov. Dawes' message to the legislature is a worthy public document and is highly commented on by the press of the state. The document shows the condition of state affairs in a clear and concise manner and is a credit to Gov. Dawes, who keeps a watchful eye over the affairs of Nebraska. During the last two years the governor has only pardoned one person out of the pent tentiary, and commuted two death sentances to life imprisonment. Dur ing the course of the message he rec commends that the present tax law be changed so that farmers can pay their taxes in two installments. This is indeed a most sensible suggestion, and the legislature would do well to heed this advice. It would certainly lighten the burden of tax paying. Another good point in the message is the recommendation that a law be passed fixing a maximum passenger rate on ! railways at 3 cents per mile, also that suitable legislation be had looking to the reduction of present freight rates on Nebraska railways. The document must be classed as among the most able state papers presented to any legslature for action and guidance.
