THE LATE RAILROAD WRECK.

The Eastern Extension of the Virginia Midland Railroad—Five Persons Killed and Great Loss of Mail Matter.

WASHINGTON, February 21.—The latest report from the scene of the railroad accident at Four Mile makes it certain that five men were killed, all train hands. All the passengers, seventy in number, escaped serious injury. The state of the express car had been opened shortly before the accident and the flames had such holdway the express agents could not assist. The contents were burned. An amount of the watches having been burned, it was not possible to get out much money worth in the safe, but it is variously estimated at \$100,000. A number of silver watches were taken out of the wreck, being totally burned, and many more were melted into gold bars.
