RAILROAD LAWS.

The Railroad Commission Bill-Full Text of Its Provisions - The Passenger Tariff Bill and What Its Provisions are

Following is the full text of Mr. Snell's Railroad Commission bill: He it enacted by the Legislature

State of Nebraska: SECTION I. The Attorney General Secretary and Auditor of Public Accounts shall constitute a Board of Radroad Commissioners, each of whom shall have power to aphe performance of their duties as such commission. The Secretaries shall be selected respectively from the First Second and Third Congressional Districts, and they shall be paid each a salary of \$2,000 per annum. The Secretaries of the Board shall take the oath of office prescribed for State officers and shall each enter into bonds. to be approved by the Governor, in the sum of Shines, conditioned for the faithful performance of their duties.

Suc. 2. Said Commissioners shall have the general supervision of all rathroads operated by steam in this State, and shall nquire later. any neglect or violation of any of the laws of this State, by any corporation doing or employes thereof; and shall also from time to time carefully examine and inspect equipment, and the manner of its conduct and management with reference to the pubhe safety, interest and convenience.
