M. WADDINGTON, the French Ambassador, has notified the Marquis of Salisbury that France, without waiting for the ratification of the treaty of peace with China, which was signed June 9, has issued orders to all French commanders to raise the blockade of Chinese

In Paris the average longevity of wspapers is about the same as that of men. The Press, founded by Emile de Girardin in 1836, has just died in what is considered a green old age. The Patrie was established in 1841. The Debats and Constitutionnel are still wider; but the oldest of all is the Gazette de France, which first saw light in the reign of Louis XIV.

THE New South Wales contingent, which took part in the Soudan campaign, arrived home on the 23rd. They were given a tremendous ovation. The day was made a public holiday. Delegates came from all the colonies in Australia, and all the available troops were drawn up to welcome the returning soldiers. The splendid spectacle was slightly marred by unfavorable weather. The Governor delivered an address to the contingent, thanking them in the name of the Queen and the colonies for the great service they had rendered.

MINISTER OSBORN, acting in accordance with instructions received from the State Department at Washington, has concluded a contract securing to the Central and South American Telegraph Company a concession to establish cables between Buenos Ayres and Rio de Janerio, and land lines between Buenos Ayres and the Pacific side, thus securing to an American company continuous aud independent telegraphic communication between the United States and Brazil. The necessary decree has been signed by the President of the Argentine Republic.

THE investigation of the accounts of the Bureau of Equipment of the Navv Department at Washington, now being carried on by the special committee detailed for the purpose by the Secretary of the Navy, promises to develop some revelations of an interesting nature. Already several irregularities have been discovered in the books, but they will not be published until the whole investigation is concluded, which will not be for another month. Several of the other bureaus have been looked into in a casual manner, but their further investigation has been postponed until the examination of the Equipment Bureau is unished.

GREAT excitement has prevailed in the financial and railway circles of Mexico owing to the sudden official announcement by the Government of new laws regarding the payment of taxes. the cutting down of official salaries, and the suspension of railway subsidies. The special, which is from a reliable man at the agency, says that the Indians are in sufficient force to butcher all the whites, including the troops now stationed there. The Indians keep their ponies picketed night and day, and they are well armed and have plenty of ammunition. The people at the agency dare not attempt trying to reach the Kansas border.
