The most resisting American wood is beech, and it is also very strong, but for -tilfness it counts below elm, or vellow pine or larch. Stiffness is that quality in a girder, for example, which makes it hold tirm, however weak it may be or incapable of standing a sudden shock. In short, it is like stiffness

in a man, who may not be able to strike The least stiff of our building woods is codar, but it has a very high power of very low among the woods. Referring again to the weight of lumber, a cubic foot of water weighs over sixty-two pounds, while a cubic foot of dry oak only weighs thirty-nine pounds. A cubic foot of water weighs some five pounds less tuan green oak. It is the water in the unseasoned lumber which weighs only fifty-three pounds to the said the gruff gentleman.
