A dozen years ago an Antwerp tailor bought for a franc a dirty little picture which had belonged to an old doctor then recently deceased. The tailor hung the picture upon the wall, but did not think it worth the cost of cleaning, and nobody found it very attractive. A little while ago, however, an artist happened to see it, and induced the owner to lend it to him to clean. No sooner was the first coat of dirt removed than there was seen in one of the corners the signature: "Pietro Paolo Rubens, 1614." The picture represented a Christ blessing the world, and it is said to be in exactly the same position as the original. The artist received six hundred dollars for his picture, but he is waiting until rich American comes along.

China and Glassware.
One of the most important things is to season glass and china to sudden changes of temperature, so that they will remain sound after exposure to sudden heat or cold. This is best done by placing the articles in cold water, which must gradually be brought to the boiling point, and then allowed to cool very slowly, taking several hours to do it. The commoner the materials the more care in this respect is required. The very best glass and china is always well seasoned, or annealed before it is sold. If the wares are properly seasoned in this way they may be washed in boiling water without fear of fracture, except in frosty weather, when, even with the best annealed wares, care must be taken not to place them suddenly in too hot water. All china that has any gilding upon it may on account be rubbed with a cloth of any kind, but merely rinsed first in hot and afterward in cold water, and then left to drain till dry. If the gilding is very dull and requires polishing, it may now and then be rubbed with a soft wash leather and a little dry whiting; but this operation must not be repeated more than once a year, otherwise the gold will most certainly be rubbed off and the china spoiled. When the plates, etc., are away in the china closet, pieces of paper should be placed between them to prevent scratches on the glaze or painting, as the bottom of all ware has little particles of sand adhering to it, picked up from the oven wherein it was glazed. The china closet should be in a dry situation, as a damp closet will soon tarnish the gilding of the china.

In a common dinner service, it is a great evil to make the plates too hot, as it invariably cracks the glaze on the surface, if not the plate itself. If you know the result—it comes apart: "no body broke it;" "it was cracked before;" or "cracked a long time ago." The fact is, when the china is injured, every time the "chines" are washed the water gets to the interior, swells the porous clay, and makes the whole fabric rotten. In this condition they will also absorb grease, and when exposed to further heat the grease makes the dishes brown and discolored. If an old, ill-used dish be made hot in a deal, fat will be seen to exude from the minute fissures upon its surface. These latter marks apply more particularly to common wares.

As a rule, warm water and a soft cloth are all that is required to keep glass in good condition; but water bottles and wine decanters, in order to keep them bright, must be filled with a little muriatic acid (commonly known as spirits of salt), which is the best agent for removing the "fur" which collects in them. This acid is far better than ashes, sand or shot, for ashes and sand scratch the glass, and if any shot is left in by accident it is poisonous. Richly cut glass must be cleaned and polished with a soft brush, upon which a little fine chalk or whiting is put; by this means the luster and brilliancy are preserved.—Hotel Register.

British Army Nationalities.
Among other instructive matter in that best of all blue books, the general annual return of the army, there is a table giving the nationalities of the rank and file since Jan. 1, 1885. At that date the proportion per 1,000 men was 593 English, 54 Scotch, 308 Irish, and 5 foreigners. Compared with the respective population of the three divisions of the United Kingdom, the Irish then showed by far the most martial spirit. A steady change, however, set in about that time, the number of English recruits increasing year after year, while that of the Irish fell off. This tendency has gone on ever since, almost without interruption, and on the 1st of January of this year the English proportion was 739 per 1,000, while the Irish had fallen to 178. Scotch recruiting also diminished since that year, the present proportion being 78. It ought, however, to be considerably larger than it is, to meet the recruiting requirements of the more numerous Scotch regiments. As the reverse is the case, the conclusion would seem to be those battalions are much more leavened with English recruits than before the territorial system became established. The number of the several nationalities on Jan. 1 were respectively: English, 128,022; Scotch, 15,720; and Irish, 31,233, a striking contrast to 1885, when they were 108,810, 17,011, and 56,283. It is noteworthy that more than half the Irish diminution has taken place since 1883, indicating that Mr. Parnell's teaching has had some effect in restraining Irishmen from enlisting.—London Globe.

Terror of Haunted Locomotives.
Locomotives engineers are almost, if not altogether, as superstitious in regard to haunted locomotives as sailors in regard to haunted ships. About ten years ago the engine Mat Morgan blew up while standing on the track of the Shore Line road near the station in Providence, R. I., killing the engineer. The engine was rebuilt and run on the road. On the first trip that she made after being rebuilt she went tearing into Providence in the night with the train swinging behind and the sleeping trainee whooping to the shrill whistle. On approaching the station the engineer leaped forward to shut off the steam, but to his horror a ghastly form appeared at his side and a ghastly hand grasped his wrist and held him fast. When the station was reached the ghost disappeared and the engineer stopped the train some distance beyond. At least, this is what the engineer tells.

Many people have not forgotten the terrible Richmond switch disaster several years ago on the Providence and Stonington road. A little brook became swollen by the rain and carried away a railroad bridge. The train came rushing along that night and was hurled into the chasm. Giles, the engineer, when he saw the danger ahead, instead of leaping from the engine as his firm did, grasped the lever and reversed the engine. But it was too late. The train was going at such speed that the locomotive leaped clear across the stream, and they found Giles lying under his overturned engine with the lever clenched through his body and one hand clutching the throttle-valve with the grasp of death. Giles, when he came into Providence, was accustomed to give two peculiar whistles as a signal to his wife, who lived near the railroad where it enters the suburbs of the city, that he was all right and would soon be home. The absence of those whistles was the first intimation which was received at Providence of the disaster. When the engine which made the terrible leap on that stormy night was rebuilt and put on the road again there was at first great trouble in getting engines for it, with such a superstitious horror was it regarded. To-day there are people ready to swear that they have heard whistles, such as Giles used to blow as signals to his wife, sound through the suburbs of Providence when no train was coming up the road.—N. Y. Tribune.

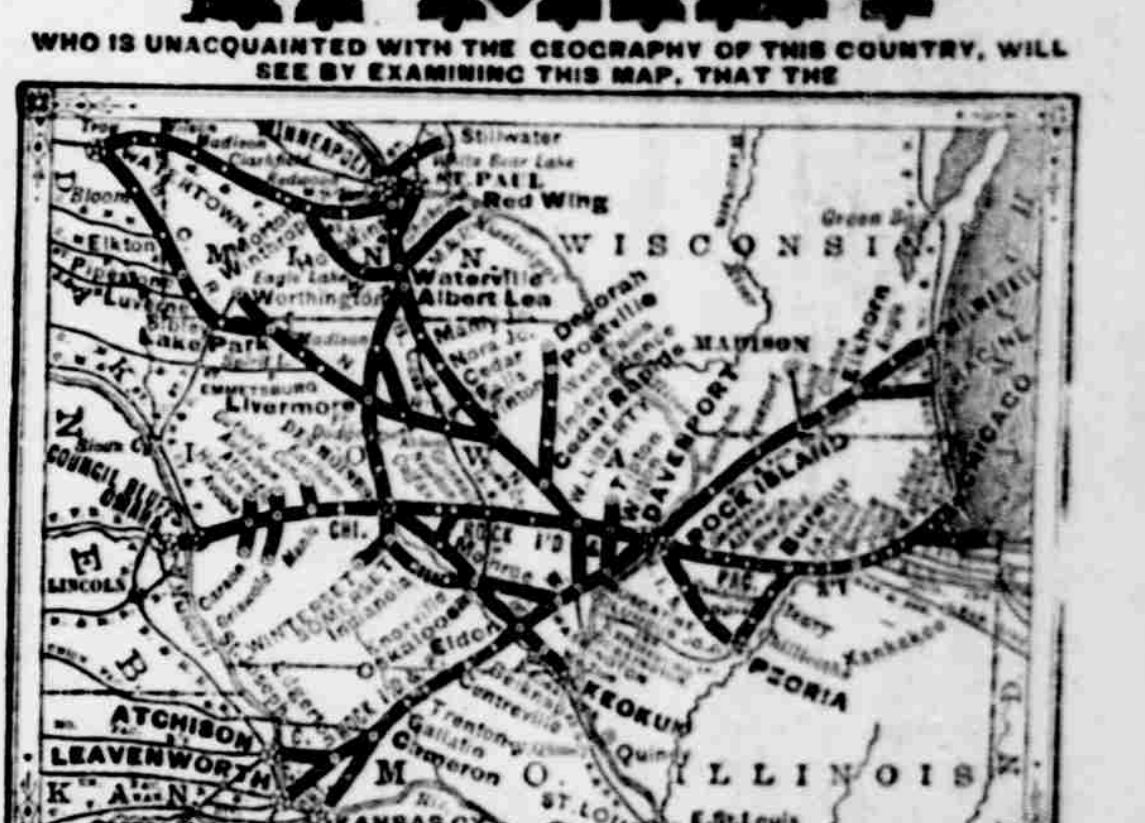
