POLAR CLIMATES.

Daly a Slight Change Would Cover tirageland With Verdure. The theory has long been advanced that the poles of greatest cold are not coincident with the terrestrial poles, and that the lowest mean temperature is to

be found in the region of the Lena river Siberia. This idea was encouraged by the fact, among others, that the Polaris, party reported a milder climate at Thank God Harbot than Kane experienced about 200 miles further wouth. The part of the argument, however, which relates to the Lena river valley is directly contradicted by Lieut. Greely's observations for two years at Lady Franklin Bay, where he found the lowest mean temperature yet observed, about - 4" Fahrenheit. Grinnell Land, therefore, as far as we vet know, is the

coldest part of the northern hemishpers. Danish Greenland, whose mean temperature hovers around the freezing point, is buried under hundreds of feet of ice simply because about two inches of ice forms in winter more than is thawed out in summer. The authorities in terrestrial physics agree that it would require only a slight change in climate conditions to remove Greenland's ice blanket and cover the land with verdure. Were it not for the presence of these immense ice masses constantly refrigerating the air, the summers of Danish Greenland would be as warm as those of England. Mr. Wallace is of the opinion that if the two arctic currents that flow south along sides of Greenland were diverted from that country, the great ice mantle would rapidly disappear, and the country might even become forest-clad and habitable. Mr. Croll agrees with him in this opinion, and both Mr. Croll and Sir William Thomson believe that it would not take a very large increase in the temperature and volume of the aretic branch of the gulf stream to produce

the same result. The powerful modifying influence that the great ocean currents from the south exert upon climates is nowhere so strikingly manifested as along the north coast of Norway, which has a milder temperature than any other part of the world in the same latitude. At this moment the little town of Bossekop, lying at the foot of a fiord which opens into the icy waters of the Arctic Ocean. wrapped in the twilight of the winter night, is subsisting largely on the grain that was raised last summer on the valley farms in a latitude about 600 miles north of the south end of Greenland. This fertile spot is the most northern place in the world where wheat and rye

ripen.
It is the opinion of Sir William Thomson and other physicists that the prolitic animal and regetable life which cover-ed Greenland and the neighboring lands in a former geological age, whose fossil remains have been found in abundance, was due to warm ocean currents flowing north at a time when our continent had not yet risen above the surface to impede or divert their course. There seems, after all, to be no inherent improbability in the theory, to elucidate which two books have been recently. written, that human life existed, and perhaps originated, in these polar lands before the present populous part, of the earth were habitable. - N. 1. Sun.

Compassion and the Dog.

nourished dog, and to take him out for an airing with a chain to his collar is to restrict his freedom. He does not get the exercise which he should have. t partakes of eruelty to muzzle and chain a dog when there is no necessity for doing so. The compassionate feel-ing which led that resolute type of man, Gen. Jackson, to care for the motherless lamb, demands that dogs shall not be bounded into a species of madness by people whose fears have been excited to an unnatural degree by the spread of false stories. It also demands that they shall not be compelled to wear usuales when no dangerous symptoms are man-ifest. John Hollingwood's definition of hydrophobia is recellent. He said some years ago that it is a "peculiar specimen that seizes uses and frupels them to destroy dogs."—Turf. Field. and Form.
