**Memorial Day.**  
 HEADQUARTERS DEPARTMENT OF NEBRASKA, G. A. R.  
 GRAND ISLAND, April 22, 1886.  
 General Order No. 3.

Once again in the mutations of time and in compliance with General Order No. 16 of the Commander-in-Chief, we are called upon to observe Memorial Day, and honor the noble dead, who gave themselves as a bulwark of safety to our beloved nation, in her greatest need, as well as those comrades who have since then to the final roll call, and joined the Grand Army above.

Since the 30th day of May next falls on Sunday, Monday, the 31st day of May, is the time appointed by our own law, and will be so observed by this department.  
 Comrades, let us unite in this solemn service, in which a reunited and patriotic nation participates in paying homage to the remnant of mortality now deposited in voiceless tombs, and ascribe anew on the tablets of our hearts the memories of our heroic dead. May our demonstrations be to the world a testimonial of grateful mankind, for the deeds they have done and the radiant glory with which they have crowned the nation.

On this day of recollection it is most fitting that we, Comrades of the Grand Army, should display the symbols of reverence and affection, for these who in their marches have reached the other shore, were our comrades, and we are now their historians and witnesses. It was ours to behold all that they did and suffered, to know that they faltered not, but experienced "the dark hours of imprisonment, the helplessness of the hospital, the sharp agony of the field."

Human life is not altogether measured by the number of years to which it may be prolonged, but that life is most valuable which best subverts life's great ends, and when the passions of the times are stilled in the grave, and the men of this generation have passed away from the earth, the gathering plaudits of coming generations will greet the memory of those who in a great crisis saved the Nation—

But today the shadows of bereavement yet brood too heavily over many a heart and home, to see the great good which their sore loss has gained.  
 Let us, then, lay aside the cares and duties of daily life, seek out the grave of every comrade buried within the limits of our department, no matter what his rank or position, and on each grassy mound where rest our heroes lay a wreath, plant a flag, and drop a tear.

Nor should the graves of our patriotic women be forgotten. Above the lowly mounds of the army nurses, of those who rendered loving service to the Union soldier, of your own number who have fallen by the way, never again to respond to the call, "Come, and help us," let tender hands strew the flowers that shall tell the story of loyalty and love.

Each Memorial Day reveals new vacancies in our ranks, and we are constantly admonished that we are fast passing away, and that we too must soon be numbered in the ranks of the "Grand Army" beyond.

The regulation uniform should be worn, but no member of the Grand Army stay out of the line on that day for want of one.  
 Let Posts of the Grand Army everywhere assemble. Enlist all loyal hearts in observance of the day. Let all who reverence the flag unite in the ministrations of loyalty and affection. Our comrades sleep well, no tear can disturb their profound slumber, no perfume of flowers make their rest more sweet,—but wherever Memorial Day is observed there arises a higher ideal of American valor, a holier care for the men who saved the Nation.

A special invitation is hereby extended to all honorably discharged soldiers, sailors, and marines, all civic and religious societies, and all patriotic and loyal citizens in general, to join with us in these ceremonies.  
 The assistance of teachers and pupils of our schools, and others, in supplying flowers in the past, is gratefully acknowledged, and its continuance earnestly requested.  
 It is requested that the ministry be invited to deliver appropriate discourses on the Sabbath preceding the Memorial Day, and Posts meet at their halls and march in a body to the churches selected.
