SUPERVISORS' REPORT.

RED CLOUD, May 4, 1886. Meeting called to order by C. G. Wilson, Chairman. Present I. H. Hampton, C. Gust, Jos. Garber, J. W. Stoddard, Wm. Kyker, T. J. Wilder, R. V. Shirey, W. H. Howe, R. M. Jones, J. L. Frame and A. J. Kenney.

Record of last meeting read and approved. On motion the following official bonds approved: Fred Huppert, overseer of highways for district No. 14; Mathias Stadler, same for district 49; C. C. Cox, same for district Henry Gilham, township clerk Red Cloud; James Amaek, treasurer Garfield township; Washington Reed, township clerk Glenwood township; H. D. Ranney, J. P. for Potsdam precinct; J. C. Warner, J. P. Red Cloud township.

Certificate of county judge showing filing of bond of J. L. Frame supervisor of Batin township presented to the board, certificate approved and J. L. Frame admitted as a member of the county board.

J. M. Stoddard instructed to complete bridge across Chestnut creek and present account.

On motion the following settlements were made with road supervisors: F. G. Fairhead, amount due \$10.00; L. T. Olinstead, amount due \$1.25; Joseph Fiskley, amount due \$1.25; A. J. Kent, amount due \$1.25; C. H. Jasperon, amount due \$1.25.

On motion the chairman of board appointed J. L. Frame, W. W. Hogate and R. D. Jones to appraise school lands.

On motion that the taxes for road and bridge purposes collected for the year 1885 from the various townships be returned to the township treasurers to be used for the purpose of building roads and bridges, carried.

On motion county treasurer instructed to give J. Q. Potter a tax receipt for lots 12 and 13, block 28, in Red Cloud on payment of \$11.72.

Petition of R. M. Jones and others asking for an appropriation for the purpose of building a bridge 36 feet long across Oak creek between sections 10 and 15, granted.

On motion petition for a bridge across Beaver creek between sections 23 and 24, town 2, range 9, granted and \$75 or so much as may be necessary appropriated for that purpose.

Petition for an appropriation of \$25, to be invested in bridge lumber by the supervisor and used in building culverts in Catherton township, to be equally divided between the two road districts in said town, granted.

Petition for an appropriation of \$25 to purchase lumber for roads in Batin township, granted.

Petition for an appropriation of \$25 to purchase lumber for roads and bridges in Glenwood township, granted.

The petition for an appropriation of \$25 for repairing bridges in Line precinct, granted.

The petition for an appropriation of \$25 or as much thereof as is necessary to build a bridge across Hicks creek in Road district No. 29, granted.

The petition for an appropriation of \$85 for the construction of a bridge across Elm creek in the village of Cowles, Pleasant Hill township, granted.

Petition for a road near Blue Hill presented to the board and petition granted on condition that F. Peiser and A. Mandelbaum waive damages assessed by appraisers and E. L. Ford and A. D. Waterman accept damages as assessed, waiving right of appeal.

Moved and carried that Douglas Terry be required to pay his taxes to the county treasurer and then appear before the county board and show cause why the same should not be paid.

RED CLOUD, May 5, 1886. Board met pursuant to adjournment and was called to order by C. G. Wilson, chairman.

Petition for a road near Blue Hill presented to the board and petition granted on condition that F. Peiser and A. Mandelbaum waive damages assessed by appraisers and E. L. Ford and A. D. Waterman accept damages as assessed, waiving right of appeal.

Moved and carried that Douglas Terry be required to pay his taxes to the county treasurer and then appear before the county board and show cause why the same should not be paid.

On motion road tax named in petition from Miner Bros be transferred from R. D. 3 to R. D. 30. Outside of this road tax the petition was rejected.

On motion that claim of C. H. Potter against the county for house rent for J. S. Burkhead be allowed and a warrant drawn on the county general fund provided plaintiff withdraws suit and pays costs, carried. Year 8, may 6.

On motion that claim of Archibald Thompson against county for house rent for Jessie Cline, eight months in 1885, be allowed and warrant drawn on general fund for \$44 provided plaintiff pays cost and withdraws suit, carried. Year 10, may 4.

On motion that claim of C. H. Potter against county for \$20 house rent for John Moody, be allowed provided plaintiff pays cost and withdraws suit, carried.

On motion A. J. Kenney was chosen chairman pro tem and authorized to sign warrants drawn.

On motion petition for public road at the mill granted.
