THE SUNNY SOUTH.

McEwan, Tenn., May 25, 1886.

Our spring has been very pleasant and warm, but summer is at hand. Rather warm, but plenty of rain to keep crops growing. Wheat is headed out and will be ready to harvest soon. Oats and millet doing well; corn looks very well and has been cultivated twice. It does not grow here as rapidly when it first comes up, as it does with you, but it grows a considerable taller. Tame grass is fine, clover is in bloom, and stands three feet high. Vegetables are very fair. We begin to have new peas and potatoes. Peaches are a failure. The winter was too warm for them; they started to bud and then there came a cold snap and froze them. Apples, pears, plums, and all small fruits will be a heavy crop this year. The flowers are very fine. The South may well be termed the land of roses; the door yards are full, the garden fences are covered with the bushes, all colors in bloom together, and the roadside is lined with wild roses. They are a singular rose, the bush being about six feet high, and flowers are very fragrant. McEwan just now is a dull town in matters of trade, but candidates are on a boom; we have seven for constable in the 10th district, and six in the fifth. Wherever a group is seen on the street you will find a candidate; they do a good share of their own electioneering. Election is only held once in two years. If a man is beaten he has to stand off and try next time. If this was the law in Nebraska it would not be quite so hard on those politicians near Inavale as to trot around the circle every fall. A meeting of citizens was held in McEwan last night to take some action to build an academy. \$800 was subscribed, and soon we hope to have a fine school in good running order.
