On May 1 the savings banks of Maine had on deposit \$36,293,504, and the excess of assets over actual liabilities was \$4,583,719.

The saloon-keepers of Cincinnati have decided not to pay the tax under the Dow law until the matter has been tested in the court.

The infantry regiments at Frankfort-on-the-Main are being drilled to use bicycles and tricycles for military purposes. The men ride the machines in marching order.

The village of Rawley Springs, Va., was almost completely destroyed by fire the other morning. All the places of resort with the exception of the Baltimore House were burned. The loss is estimated at \$130,000, with insurance at \$13,000.

The Midlothian Unionists recently sent a delegation to wait upon Lord Hartington to ask him to assist them in putting forward a Unionist to oppose Mr. Gladstone. Lord Hartington replied that he would rather see the Liberal Union split than harass the Premier.

ACTING SECRETARY FAIRFIELD has instructed the Collector of Customs at New York to grant free entry to one hundred and eighty-seven plaster casts of ancient sculptures, which are expected to arrive in New York in a short time for exhibition at the industrial exposition to be held at Minneapolis.

GENERAL HAZEN, Chief Signal Officer, is out in a vigorous protest against the proposed amendment of the Signal Service School, at Fort Myer, Va. He says General Sherman's recommendation to that effect is due to ignorance of the importance of the school.

The case of Thankful Tanner against Mrs. James A. Garfield to recover twenty-four thousand dollars damages for slight injuries sustained in a collision with Mrs. Garfield's carriage, was submitted to the jury at Cleveland, O., on the 8th. The jurors, after three hours' deliberation, returned a verdict in favor of Mrs. Garfield.
