Gone to Her Reward.

On last Sunday morning, June 20th suddenly, without previous illness Mrs. Sarah Mick, an old and highly respected resident of Webster county, and of this city, passed peacefully, and apparently painless to the unseen shore. She attended the meeting in progress at the court house on Saturday night as she had done almost every night for the past four weeks, apparently in her usual health, rested as usual through the night and on Sunday morning and made preparation for the duties of the day. About six o'clock she was taken suddenly ill and expired within a few minutes. Mrs. Mick was born in east Tennessee, January 7th, 1806. Her maiden name was Kinkerson, and her father was a preacher of the Christian church. She united with the church at the age of 16, and about a year after, January 16, 1823 she was married to Lewis Kizer and elder of the Christian church with whom she lived happily 39 years. In 1847 she became a widow with a family of six children. Three of these W. H. Kizer of Webster, Iowa, Mrs. Tullis of Stewart, Iowa, and Mrs. McBrule of this city, are still living. Three years later she married Chas. Mick, by whom she had one son, Mr. Luther Mick, now in the mercantile business at Salem, Kansas. Mrs. Mick a second time became a widow in 1848 while living in Indiana. She came from Iowa to Nebraska in 1870 bringing with her two motherless grandchildren the first children ever brought to Webster county, and settled on a homestead near Guide Rock. About ten years ago she sold her homestead and removed to this city where she has lived ever since, highly esteemed by all who knew her, and few were better known than "Grandma Mick." She was a devoted Christian woman, and those who mourn her loss mourn, but as those who have no hope Her funeral took place on Tuesday at the Baptist church, and was very largely attended. The services were conducted by Elder R. C. Barrow, assisted by C. M. Barnes and were very impressive. A long array of carriages followed the remains to the cemetery where "Grandma Mick" will rest till God shall wake the sleeping dead.


