On motion the following funds were ordered transferred to the county general surplus fund viz: County sinking fund, \$80.90; funding bond fund, \$50.80; bridge judgement fund \$129.25. Total \$261.95.

Resolved that a warrant for \$50.00 be drawn on the county general fund to be used in defraying the expenses of an institute to be held in Red Cloud during the month of July, 1886.

Requested that all members of Post No. 80, G. A. R., report at headquarters on next Monday, July 26, as there is business of importance to transact.

WALNUT CREEK.

The horses injured by wire fences some time ago, will soon be able to go to work again. J. S. Richards, of Wymore, has been calling on friends here.

Miss E. M. Richmond has been visiting friends on Walnut Creek this week. The Union Pacific officials are busily engaged in closing up the details of their fast express scheme, which is certain to go into operation at once.

The train will be put on July 15, 1886 if something at present unforeseen does not prevent, said a Union Pacific official to day. "It will leave Omaha in the morning, taking the place of the overland, and will make the trip between Omaha and Frisco in sixty or less."
