Immediate delivery may, at third and fourth class offices be made by the postmaster himself, by an assistant of clerk, or by any other competent. person he may employ as messenger. Eastmasters are required to open all matter on arrival and immediately separate matter bearing special delivery stamps and stampor write on the cuvelope or wrapper the name of the office and the date and hour when the matter arrives. Next the matter must be numbered, after which it must be delivered without loss of time. For every article delivered the postmaster must take a receipt. After a special delivery article. has been taken out for delivery and has been returned with the information that the person addressed has removed to another place and the article is then forwarded it is not then to be regarded

as entitled to special delivery at the second office. Registeral matter will be entitled to special delivery the same as ordinary matter when bearing a special dislivery stamp in addition to full postage and registry fee. No effort must be spored by postmasters or any other officer to expedite
