Andrew Jackson was a hard worker, but he was a democratic fellow, and he liked horse-racing, cockfighting and a good social smoke. He often attended the cock-lights on the Washington Heights, above Sixteenth street, and at one of the great races of the day of his Presidency he had a horse of his own admitted under the name of his private secretary, Major Donelson. President Harrison was a great walker, another great horseback rider, and he was accustomed to gallop through the streets of Washington at midnight on a fine blooded steed. 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
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
