\$25,000 Post Office Building for Red Cloud. Thus we boom.

Senator Paddock has introduced a bill in the U. S. Senate, which has been endorsed by the postmaster general and recommended by the senate committee on public buildings, to establish public postoffice buildings in all cities where the office business has been three thousand dollars per year for the last three years.

The postmaster general reports the following cities of Nebraska as meeting the requirements of the bill: Ashland, Aurora, Beatrice, Blair, Central City, Columbus, Crete, Grand Island, Hastings, Hebron, Holdrege, Kearney, Lincoln, McCook, Minden, Nebraska City, Neligh, Norfolk, North Platts, Omaha, Pawnee City, Plattsmouth, Plum Creek, Red Cloud, St. Paul, Schuyler, Seward, Sidney, Tecumseh, Wahoo, Wymore and York.
