

HOME-MADE CHEESE.

How a Very Good Article Can Be Produced by Farmers' Wives.

To make whole milk cheese, strain the milk in a clean tin boiler, setting it on the range where it will remain at near blood heat or say 85 degrees.

If one has not sufficient milk to make cheese at one setting, the curd from the first lot can be hung away in a cool place before salting...

When the cheese is taken from the press it should be bandaged with cheese cloth to keep it from spreading. The temperature of the curing room should be about 64 degrees.
