A Treet That May Bust. Twine has become an important fac tor in gathering the wheat, oats and rye harvests in this country. The manufacturers of binder twine have organized a trust and propose to make the farmers pay nearly double the price heretofore paid. When the binder twine first came into use it took only two pounds to each sere of oats, but now it takes three pounds. The twine was then not more than ten cents a pound, and it only cost twenty cents to bind an acre of oats. When it took three pounds to the acre the price advanced to thirteen cents, which made the cost thirtynine cents an acre. The twine monopolists are not satisfied with this extra twist in the coil to rob the farmers, but now they propose to increase the price to twenty-five cents a pound, which will make the binding of the oat harvest about seventy-five an acre. This is equivalent to three bushels of oats to the acre for binder twine alone, so that after the farmer pays all other expenses and counts in the rental value of his land he has but a small margin left to recompeuse him for a season's labor. This action of the twine trust has aroused the indignation of the farmers in the grain growing states and they intend to teach the monopolistic trust a lesson.
